

OTI Students Aid Group Organized

A new group comprised of service, civic and fraternal organizations has been formed here with the idea of aiding in the problem of part-time student employment at OTI.

The group, attended by representatives of 24 organizations, held its first meeting last Tuesday in the chamber of commerce and laid out tentative plans for the year. As set up at present the goals of the club are to replenish the student loan fund and bring it up to a total of \$5000, and to aid in securing part time employment for those students who need to work in order to finance their schooling.

They emphasized that they are not in the field of getting permanent jobs for graduates, only aiding those who are in school. One representative from each organization joining in the effort will be named as a member of the board of directors. From this group will be drawn an executive board with permanent officers elected.

The next meeting will be held October 27 at the chamber of commerce at 7:30 in the evening and all clubs and organizations who have not already been contacted and who would like to participate are urged to send a representative. The idea for the club started with three men, John Van Doren, who acted as temporary chairman at the first meeting, Clarence Humble and Angus Newton, over a cup of coffee. It met with approval from many organizations and has already been placed on the activity list for the Kiwanis Club. Present at Tuesday's meeting were Mayor Landry and also State Representatives Hank Semon and Ed Geary.

"What we are striving for," said Van Doren, "is not only aid for the students but a closer understanding between the downtown businessmen and the students at our mile high college."

Arlo A. Schultz, Klamath Falls, leaves today by United Airlines for Heidelberg, Germany where he will study languages at the University of Heidelberg for the next three years.

Young Schultz, 24, is a graduate of Klamath Union High School and had two years at the University of Oregon where he studied languages with the idea of preparing for teaching or filling a position as an interpreter. During his service in military intelligence with the U.S. Army, he rounded out his studies of Russian at Monterey in California, continuing while overseas for 15 months in Germany. He was discharged recently with the rank of sergeant.

He speaks and reads Russian and German fluently. Entrance requirements for American students in German colleges are not strict, and much less complicated than in U.S. colleges. He has been employed by Eldon Ait, contractor. Schultz is the son of Mrs. Inger Schultz, 200 Market Street, Ponderosa Apartments.

Wheat Support Average Told

The national average support level for the 1955 wheat crop will be not less than \$2.06 a bushel, according to the county extension office. This is 82 1/2 per cent of the current parity price for wheat, the office pointed out.

The announcement added that this support rate will not be reduced but it will be increased if the wheat parity price on July 1, 1955, is higher than the parity price of \$2.50 a bushel which was used to determine the \$2.06 figure.
