Knowland Ends Oregon Tour

Sen. William P. Knowland, Senate majority leader, Thursday wound up a three-day tour of Western Oregon in behalf of Sen. Guy Cordon's campaign for reelection.

Cordon was at Lebanon and Sweet Home, where he told groups he would do everything in his power to complete flood control projects for the Willamette Basin.

His Democratic rival, Richard L. Neuberger, was at Coos Bay, still pounding at Cordon's voting record in the Senate. He asserted Cordon had a record of 100 percent on a conservation program, and had opposed President Eisenhower on foreign policy matters.

Joseph K. Carson Jr., Democratic candidate for governor, told a Fessenden audience that he was concerned over the State Liquor Commission.

"An investigation by privately employed attorneys named by the governor has been under way. If there is reason to believe there has been wrong-doing, it should be brought before the grand jury. That is what grand juries are for," Carson said.

His Republican opponent, Gov. Paul Patterson, was at Portland, where he spoke at the University of Portland Alumni Assn., urging corporations and individuals to give private financial support to colleges.

Heart Disorder Hits Politico

Rogue Valley Pioneer Dies

Amelia Britt, 89, daughter of Linkville's first reported photographer and last surviving member of a pioneer Oregon family, died Wednesday afternoon at her home in Jacksonvile. She had been bed-ridden two years.

Miss Britt was a lifelong resident of Jacksonvile and a behind-the-scenes worker in town politics. She was the daughter of Peter Britt, immigrant from Obstdalen, Switzerland, who came to Jacksonvile in 1852 from Illinois. He was a landscape and portrait artist, the Oregon Territory's first photographer who is also reported to have taken the first picture of Linkville.

Miss Britt died in the hand-carved bed in which she was born August 1, 1865. At the time of her death she was the oldest member of the Southern Oregon Native Daughters Lodge, member of the Southern Oregon Historical Society, Adalee Chapter, OES, and Daughters of the Nile.

Funeral services will be Monday at Perle Funeral Home, Medford, with interment in the family plot.
