Bessy's Dairy Dishes

Modern methods of handling milk and milk products account largely for the superior quality and economy of dairy foods enjoyed by everyone.

Manufacturers of dairy machinery and supplies, have united to provide equipment and methods that will permit the handling of larger herds with less effort and labor on the part of the dairyman.

Typical of this trend are 1) mechanized feeding; 2) the pipe line milking system and the milking parlor; and 3) the use of cooling tanks which permit handling of bulk cooled milk from farm to city plant.

In the city processing plant, too, the continuous processing line is being developed to give maximum protection to the quality of dairy products with a minimum of cost.

In Oregon this protection—this sanitation—is a "must" because the milk marketing act makes it so.

Now here's a quick, easy, delicious recipe you'll like, I hope.
BUTTERMILK PIE
1 cup buttermilk
1 cup sugar
1 cup raisins
2 eggs, beaten
1/2 teaspoon each preferred spices
