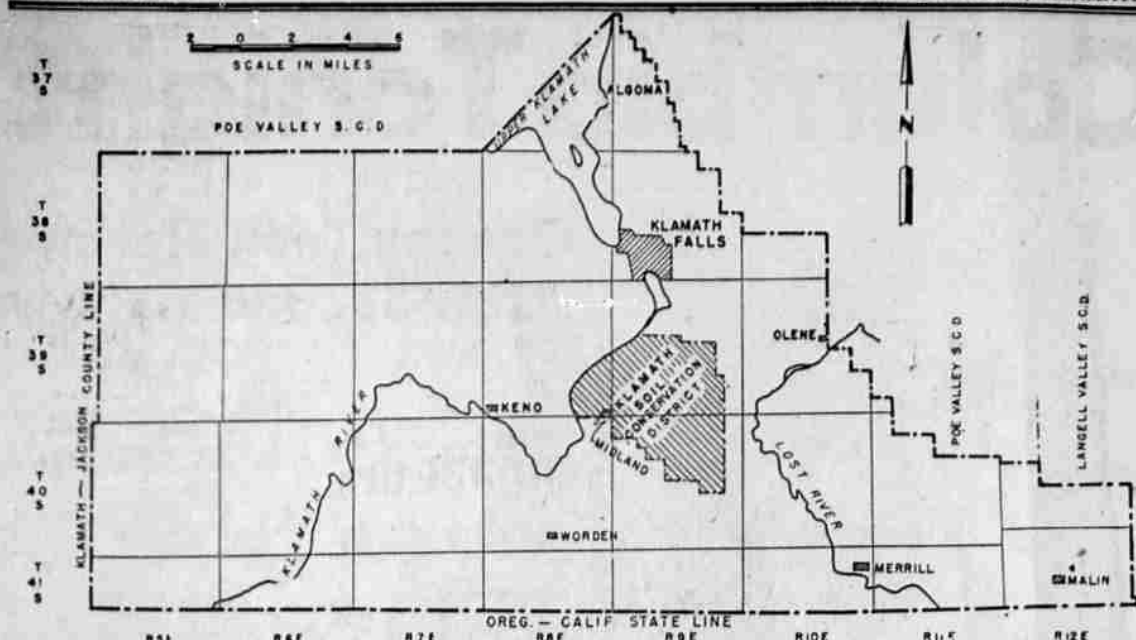

Three Killed In Air Crash

NEBRASKA CITY, Neb. (AP)—The three-man crew of a World War II vintage bomber was killed late yesterday when the plane crashed on a farm 6 miles northwest of here.

The B25 was on a training flight from nearby Offutt Air Force Base. Wilbur Fey and his son, started by the sound of a low flying plane, rushed out to see it pass about 200 feet above a barn and crash near the foot of a hill. It did not burn.

Pilot of the ship was Maj. Joseph H. Tichenor, 32, father of five. Copilot was Capt. Truman G. Kolla, 36, and the crew chief was A2 C. John E. Hindman. Tichenor's home was Louisville, Ky., and Kolla, Rock Island, Ill., and Hindman was from near Butler, Pa.

Raftsmen's Trip Related

PAGO PAGO, American Samoa. (AP)—A lone raftman who drifted more than 6,000 miles from Peru to Samoa disclosed Saturday that he once narrowly escaped death when tossed overboard while pulling in a shark.

William Willis, 61-year-old New Yorker, arrived Friday after a 115-day voyage on his 35-foot balsam raft, "Seven Little Sisters," the winner in a test of one man against the sea.

Refreshed after his first night's sleep ashore since June 21, he told of his close call which came while he was five weeks out from Callao, Peru.

He was pulling in a five-foot shark when the raft rolled, tossing him into the sea.

He barely managed to grab the tip of a line he had trailing behind the raft. Quickly he wrapped it around his left wrist.

Slowly he inched himself forward to the tossing raft. He said the line bit into his wrist so badly that it cut an artery.

But he didn't notice the spurting blood until he had clambered back onto the raft.

"That was the worst incident of the entire trip," Willis said.

Willis arrived in good shape. So did his cat — after eating the third raft occupant, a parrot, three days ago.

Willis presented the raft to the government of American Samoa.

SP Brakeman Injured In Fall

Ben Kivett III, a Southern Pacific brakeman, was seriously injured about 2:45 p.m. Friday. He is in the Weed Hospital where his physician, Dr. D. D. Todorovic of Dunsmuir has labeled his condition as critical.

In attempting to board a moving train, Kivett apparently lost his balance and was thrown against the diesel engine.

The extent of his injuries has not been determined, according to the doctor, because of his state of shock. They are thought to include a basal skull fracture and other injuries.

Kivett's parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Kivett, 218 South First, with whom he lives in Dunsmuir, are with him.

Klamath Soil Conservation District Election Slated

October 28 has been set as the date for the special election on the proposed addition to the Klamath Soil Conservation District to include all of that part of Klamath County not already in the boundaries of a soil conservation district.

The election follows a public hearing held August 13 at which time a majority of farmers owning ten or more acres within the proposed boundaries signified approval of inclusion in the district.

Hours for voting will be from 1 to 8 p.m. in the agricultural stabilization and conservation office in the Tower theater building.

Knights Ban Three Negroes

OMAHA (AP)—An Omaha Catholic newspaper has reported that the Knights of Columbus Council turned down three Negroes for membership. The ban brought an immediate expression of disapproval from Archbishop Gerald T. Bergan.

"The True Voice" yesterday said the three had been turned down by the Father Flanagan of Boys Town Council of the Knights, a group with a membership of more than 2,000.

"I think they should be members," said Archbishop Bergan of Omaha.

One of the rejected Negro candidates was sponsored by the Very Rev. Carl Reinert, S.J., president of Creighton University. The Rev. Father Austin J. Miller, S.J., dean of men at Creighton, and Patrick Norton, business manager of Boys Town, sponsored the other two.

The True Voice reported two of the Negro candidates got six "no" votes and the third got seven "no" votes. Twenty-two non-Negro candidates were approved.

John P. Kreehl, grand knight of the Father Flanagan Council, said "I express my apology and the apology of the vast majority of the Knights. Steps already have been started to prevent discrimination."

Colored Slides To Be Shown

"Beyond the Harbor Bar," composed by Haldor Lilienas and inspired by the Columbia River Harbor Bar at Astoria, will be illustrated through colored slides of the Oregon coast at First Church of the Nazarene Monday at 7:45 p.m.

The Rev. Wesley Grist, pastor and evangelist conducting a revival at the church, will present a full color drawing of a sunset scene at The Haystack and Needles, a spot about 30 miles south of Astoria. This will be awarded Thursday night to the person bringing the most people to services Sunday Thursday.

Monday evening's program also includes a selection by Bill Carter, organist, and congregational singing.

Sermon subject is "Blessed Assurance." The public is invited to attend.

Seaplanes Ride Out High Winds

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. (AP)—A Texas northern stranded seven Navy seaplanes in the rough waters of Corpus Christi Bay yesterday after they flew from Norfolk, Va., to escape hurricane Hazel.

The 77 crewmen aboard the planes had breakfast, however lowered to them late in the morning by a Navy helicopter.

Rough water and gusty winds made it unsafe for the planes to approach the Naval Air Station seaplane ramps or take the men off. They just stayed aboard until the winds subsided.

Bus Drivers Pact Reported

SEATTLE (AP)—Union and company negotiators reached agreement on the terms of a new contract Friday night to erase the threat of a strike by 600 AFL Motor Coach Employees Union members against Northwest Greyhound bus operations.

Federal Mediator William Hosie refused to disclose terms of the agreement until it has been ratified by the rank and file members, although he did say a pay raise was included.

Northwest Greyhound serves most of the state of Washington and parts of Montana and Idaho.

Demos Show Vote Increase

PORTLAND (AP)—Democrats have increased their registered voter strength in Oregon since last May by more than 6 per cent while Republicans gained only 2 1/2 per cent, the Oregonian reported Saturday.

The newspaper said, however, that Republicans still hold a slim advantage of 2,420 registrations.

The newspaper's tabulations gave the Democrats a total of 402,322 registered voters compared with 378,781 in May, and the Republicans, 404,812 compared with 394,921.

The sharpest Democratic gain was reported in Multnomah County where the total rose 136,097 to 144,100. Republicans went up from 123,244 to 126,439. Large Democratic increases also were reported in Lane, Jackson and Douglas counties.

Democrats reported gains in every county, while Republicans added strength in all but three—Morrow, Polk and Yamhill.

Ranch Worker Arraigned

Wayne Rodney Scott, 23-year-old Beatty ranch worker, who state police say participated in a "night of terror" rifle bombardment of a Medford automobile dealer and his wife, waived preliminary hearing late Friday when arraigned before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor. He is charged with assault with intent to kill.

Scott, according to State Police Sgt. Earle Tichenor, admitted his part in the attack on Mr. and Mrs. Albert Sidney Menasco Jr. of Medford, as they were driving along a lonely road near Beatty early last Sunday morning.

Also held on an assault with intent to kill charge is James Quinton Anderson, 32, also of Beatty. He is scheduled to appear before Judge Van Vactor Monday morning and announce whether he wants a preliminary hearing.

Menasco told police that two men fired on his pickup and ridged it with bullets. Mr. and Mrs. Menasco leaped from their truck and hid behind a log in a clump of brush. Menasco said gunmen kept firing at them from 2 a.m. until after daylight Sunday.

Anderson and Scott are held in the county jail in lieu of \$5,000 bail each.

Husband Found Guilty By Jury

WILMINGTON, Del. (AP)—Frederick Hammer has been found guilty of assault with intent to kill his wealthy, estranged wife, shipping heiress Andrea Luckenbach Hammer.

A Superior Court jury returned the guilty verdict yesterday. Sentencing was postponed until Oct. 22.

Hammer also was convicted of simple assault in the shooting of Woodrow Long, Mrs. Hammer's horse trainer.

The shootings were in a stable at Delaware Park race track last June. Mrs. Hammer and Long recovered.

U.S., Canada Combine On Guided Missile Program

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States and Canada, working together under the American weapon, are going to determine how well the Nike guided missile system for anti-aircraft defense works in the bitter cold of the Arctic.

The powerful, faster-than-sound Nike has been tested so far only in Texas.

Washington and Ottawa announced last night that cold weather trials of the missile and its intricate guidance system will be made during January and February at Ft. Churchill, a post on the west coast of Hudson Bay where the thermometer sometimes drops to 50 degrees below zero.

Canadian crews, who trained the past summer at Ft. Bliss, Tex., will operate the Nike at the Canadian site with U.S. Army technicians participating.

The Army boasts the Nike can cope with any type plane now flying. But the weapon has yet to be tried out in the subzero temperatures and penetrating wind chill of the Far North to show if changes are needed for Nike systems installed near northern American or Canadian cities.

The Army also wants to know how efficiently Nike battery crews can operate the complex controls and electronic guidance levers and buttons of the Nike battery when metal is freezing cold and fingers are sheathed in mittens.

In talking to reporters about the formal announcement of the Nike test, Pentagon research and development officials also disclosed that another new weapon of the atomic age—the 280 mm cannon—had been tested last winter at Ft. Churchill. The cannon can fire atomic shells, but in the Churchill tests used only conventional explosive ammunition, they said.

Ft. Churchill contains an artillery range and a vast maneuver area which have been used extensively during recent years by joint Canadian-American units for arctic training and testing of equipment.

Presumably other guided missiles will get arctic tests at Churchill later. An official said "you can count on testing of all our weapons up there," adding that that is now routine procedure.

Nike anti-aircraft systems are being installed at about 35 sites in the United States, mainly for the protection of big industrial or port areas but also for defense of primary military bases.

The assumption is that, when tested for low temperature operation, they also will be used eventually for protecting key outer defenses of Canada and the United States, including air bases in Alaska and northern Greenland.

General Fears Red Invasion

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—Gen. Wang Shi-min, boss of Nationalist China's air force, thinks the Chinese Reds are getting ready to invade Formosa. The Nationalists, he declares, can't drop their guard for a moment.

Wang, known as "tiger" although he looks more like a bulldog, sidestepped the controversial issue of Nationalist attacks on the mainland in an interview. But it wasn't hard to see his real feeling.

He thinks the Reds intend to invade and that his air force ought to be smashing anything that looks like a buildup. The idea of holding his punch until invasion is underway doesn't appeal, although he wouldn't say so in so many words.

Wang years for the day when his pilots will have more planes, particularly F4U jets which are a match for the Communist MIG15 jets. He now has F84s, plus World War II bombers and fighter-bombers.

Malenkov Meets English Group

MOSCOW (AP)—Premier Georgi Malenkov received a British anti-party parliamentary delegation Saturday in his Kremlin office. The group was accompanied by British Ambassador Sir William Hayter.

It was the first time Malenkov has received a group of Britons in the Kremlin and the first time in five years that an ambassador from any of the major western powers has been invited there.

A British Labor Party delegation visiting here last summer met Malenkov at two dinner parties but was not invited to the Kremlin. That group was headed by former Prime Minister Clement Attlee.

Members of the British delegation said they "discussed British Soviet relations" for more than an hour with the two Russian leaders.

Ken Sweitzer Fund Approved

EUGENE (AP)—Twenty-one fraternities on the University of Oregon campus have approved creation and support of a Ken Sweitzer memorial fund, the interfraternity council announced Saturday.

Sweitzer, graduate student and former Oregon griddle, was killed in a hunting accident Thursday. Funeral services will be held here at 10 a.m. Monday.

Purpose of the fund has not been decided. Sweitzer's widow and two weeks-old daughter reside here.
