

Owls Sweep Over Lower Columbia

Canada Sparks 52-19 Win

Klamath Falls football fans got their second look at the Oregon Tech Owls last Saturday night, and a very impressive one at that, as the Mile High Campus blew a sweep to a 52-19 win over the Lower Columbia J.C. Red Devils on Modoc Field.

In the parade of touchdowns that Coach Rex Hunsaker's squad put on for a small turnout of gridiron enthusiasts, several outstanding runs by backfield men and head-up line play were present in the colorful junior college football game.

Oregon Tech wasted no time in hitting the scoring column, as they took the kickoff from the Red Devils and on the first play Doug Crippen was held for no gain making 1, second and ten for the Owls. **SPORTED**

Quarterback Dave Thomas faked to Crippen in the center of the line, but instead handed off to Linous Allen who spurred off tackle and through the Red Devil secondary for an 80 yard touchdown run and six points. A key block on the 20 yard line by John Alford gave Allen all of the room he needed for the TD. Cal "Sugar" Smith's kick for point after touchdown was good giving the Owls a 7-0 lead.

With four minutes gone in the second quarter the Owls took a Red Devil punt on their 45, and with the ball carrying of Odie Canada, Lyle Fleetwood and George Johnson the pigskin was placed on the one yard line in five tries. Canada took a handoff from quarterback Ray Rosa and boomed into the end zone for a touchdown. Canada's point after touchdown was good giving the Owls a score-board lead of 14-0.

ALL THE WAY
On the very first play of the following series, Jim Reichstein, Red Devil quarterback, dropped back and passed to Cliff Richards, who raced all the way for the first Lower Columbia touchdown of the evening. Reichstein's kick made it 14-7 in favor of the Owls.

Some of the teams that were buried far down in the preseason ratings are right in the thick of things.

Arkansas, for one, could write a real rags-to-riches story if they win the Southwest Conference title.

They haven't taken it in 18 years, but their stunning 20-7 triumph over Texas last Saturday left them one of the dozen and a half major undefeated teams in the country. They still play Texas A&M.

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So. Cal. Trojans Subdue Webfoots

PORTLAND (U)—Oregon's last hope of a New Year's Day Rose Bowl invitation was crushed Saturday by fleet-footed Jon Arnett and the Southern California Trojans.

With Arnett, a flashy sophomore halfback showing the way, the Trojans scored in the first, third and fourth periods and added a last quarter field goal to subdue the Ducks 24-14 in the nationally televised NCAA "Game of the Week."

It was Oregon's second conference loss and SC's second win in the league.

Arnett scored all three Trojan touchdowns, piling up 179 yards on his own. Sam Tsagalakis kicked the field goal when the Ducks put the stopper on another touchdown drive in the final period.

Oregon, with George Shaw handling the quarterbacking chores, played on even terms in the first half. Shaw's passes set up the first Oregon tally in the second period and the teams left the field at the half with the score tied 7-7.

SC solved the Oregon passing attack in the second half, intercepting two Shaw passes to set up scores. Halfback Lindon Crow intercepted one pass in the third period and ran 46 yards to the Oregon 11. Arnett plunged over three plays later.

of the evening on six plays, as they moved the ball from their own 45 yard line for a distance of 55 yards and a touchdown.

It was Canada again who made the Red Devil's chances look dim as he plowed into paydirt from six yards out with eight minutes remaining. The Owl's halfback attempted a conversion but the kick was blocked giving the Owls a 20-7 edge.

INTERCEPTED
Canada again moved into the act as he intercepted one of Reichstein's passes on the Lower Columbia 31 yard line. On the first down, little Johnson, who captured the eye of fans all night long, moved five yards to the 26, setting the stage for the fourth OTI score.

Rosa flipped a short pass to Charles Eccleston, who in turn lateralized to Canada on the 10 yard line, and from there the OTI back went into the end zone for a score on one of the nicest plays of the evening. This time Canada's kick split the up-rights making it 27-7 for Oregon Tech.

With a first down on the Oregon Tech 49 yard line, Lower Columbia made an effort to get back into the ball game as Reichstein again faded back and spotted Dale Smith who scored LCJC's second TD. The placement was no good sending the score to a 27-13 margin at halftime.

ACCOUNTED
Rosa and Paul Weaver accounted for the next Tech score as the Daily City, California quarterback hit Weaver with a pass on the 15 yard line and the big Owl end ran into the end zone for the score. The conversion try was wide as Canada attempted one extra point. The score stood at 33-13 and unknown to the Red Devils the axe was slated to drop again.

With six minutes and 30 seconds left in the period, OTI kicked off to Lower Columbia, and Canada's ing the Red Devils the ball on the 20 yard line.

On the first play, Spike Carter, the dangerous little Owl guard broke through the LCJC line and dropped Reichstein for a 19 yard loss, which placed the ball on the one yard line with second down coming up.

Lower Columbia went into punt formation in their end zone, and as the ball was snapped, John Alford, Owl end busted through and blocked the kick. Carter, again playing head-up ball, pounced on the loose ball in the end zone for

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
