### Hunting Rules Explained

Some Oregon hunters seem to be confused as to the forthcoming hunter's choice deer season. According to word from the Oregon State Game Commission the 3-day season follows directly the regular buck season now under way. However, certain areas of the state will close at the end of the buck season which continues through October 18. Generally, the part of Oregon east

of U. S. Highway 97 will be open for the taking of one deer of either sex. The four main closures in the eastern sector are the Deschutes game refuge, Klamath Indian res-

ervation, and the Hary mountain and Malheur federal game refuges. West of the Cascades, the open area for hunter's choice hunting is not as extensive. In most areas, hunting will be confined to within one mile of currently cultivated agricultural land, but some areas on the west side are completely closed. Hunters should consult the 1954 hunting regulation folder which has a map showing the boundaries of the areas open October 19, 20 and 21. The season is being held to help

lessen crop damage problems in western Oregon and to harvest surplus animals in eastern Oregon and thus maintain the herd numbers within the carrying capacity of the winter ranges. Hunters successful in obtaining a deer in the regular buck season

may not participate in the either sex season.

### Spud Estimate Increase Told

While the October first estimate showed a very small increase in the prospective potato supply — approximately 400,000 bushels — most of this occurred in the eastern states, according to County Agent C. A. Henderson. Maine showed a decrease of approximately 1,500,000 bushels, while Long Island, upstate New York, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Minnesota and North Dakota all showed some increase.

On the Pacific coast, the Idaho production estimate was reduced from 45,900,000 bushels to 45,135,000. Oregon decreased from 12,480,000 to 12,000,000 and the California late-crop was reduced from 16,720,000 to 15,840,000.

The state of Washington alone, among the Pacific coast states, showed an increase of approximately 400,000 bushels. On the whole, the report showed less potatoes on the Coast than the September first estimate.

An estimate of the Klamath Basin crop indicates about two thirds of the 1953 crop, Henderson stated.

### Red Clover Seed Acreage Lowers

TULELAKE — With acreage in 13 out of 19 Red clover producing states smaller this year than last, and yield per acre in 14 states also smaller, the 1954 production of Red clover seed is indicated to be the smallest in 12 years, according to Ken Baghott, Tulelake farm adviser. It is 30 per cent smaller than last year's production, and 39 per cent below the 1949-53 average.

Baghott reports drought, frosts, and record high temperatures during the summer tended to curtail the acreage of Red clover harvested for seed this year and also to reduce yields per acre. Many acres that normally would have been cut for seed were harvested for hay or were used for pasture because of the great need for forage.

This year's prospective yield of 57 pounds per acre is only two pounds less than 1953 yield but five pounds above average.

The estimated production and carry-over is 25 per cent less than in 1953 and 10 per cent below the 19 year average.

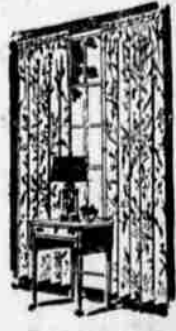
