

Mayor Held On Graft Charge

ERIE, Pa. (AP) — Charges that Mayor Thomas W. Flately and 10 other men are involved in a 20-million-dollar-a-year gambling syndicate left this lake port city in a furor Monday.

The mayor and the others were arrested in a series of raids Saturday. Flately is charged with accepting a \$300 bribe.

Dist. Atty. Damian McLaughlin of Erie County said the mayor signed a statement saying he never received any money from gamblers out received funds for political purposes from Jack Martin, chief police inspector, and Stanley Schwartz, a Democratic Party leader.

Martin and Schwartz also were arrested, along with Edward Camilli, a member of the city's vice squad, and James Salomone, described by McLaughlin as the "brains" of the syndicate.

McLaughlin quoted Martin and Schwartz as saying the mayor knew the money he received came from gamblers.

McLaughlin said the syndicate was a giant conspiracy among the mayor, certain policemen and gamblers to operate a numbers lottery and pinball machine racket that brought in some 20 million dollars yearly.

Former FHA Chief Charged

WASHINGTON (AP) — A special grand jury investigating alleged irregularities in the federal housing programs Monday filed a criminal contempt charge against Clyde L. Powell, who stepped out as assistant FHA commissioner last spring.

In a "presentment" to U. S. District Judge F. Dickinson Letts, the jury said Powell had refused to tell it whether he took the official diaries for the years 1944-54 with him when he left office.

The jury noted that Powell had previously refused to give this information last week and had been directed by Judge Letts to do so. After receiving the presentment, Judge Letts said Powell will be tried on the criminal contempt charge next Wednesday.

In contempt cases, the punishment upon conviction is entirely within the discretion of the judge.

Commentator Accuses Judge

ROSEBURG (AP) — A radio commentator said Sunday night that Roseburg Circuit Judge Carl Wimberly "might possibly have done a little fudging," by drawing a salary from the federal government.

Drew Pearson made the statement while discussing the Oregon senatorial race between Richard L. Neuberger, the Democratic candidate, and Sen. Guy Cordon, the Republican incumbent.

Wimberly is a supporter of Cordon.

Pearson said in his nation-wide broadcast Sunday night: "It now develops Wimberly might possibly have done a little fudging, for his friend, Sen. Cordon, appointed Wimberly to go on a pleasant trip to Hawaii some years ago to study statehood."

"While on the trip, Wimberly drew a salary from the state of Oregon and simultaneously drew pay from the federal government. According to Senate records he got a salary of \$861.10 plus expenses of \$531.71. Yet the state constitution of Oregon states under Article 2, Section 10, that state officials cannot hold two lucrative positions simultaneously."

Wimberly, reached at Roseburg, refused to comment.

Earlier in the campaign, Wimberly, who is a former law partner of Cordon, charged that Neuberger had been expelled from the University of Oregon Law School a number of years ago for cheating on an examination.

Neuberger denied that he had been expelled.

New Tax Forms To Be Issued

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wage earners getting less than \$5,000 a year may use a simple 15-line tax form for 1934—a possible step towards doing away with their filing of returns altogether.

Internal Revenue Commissioner T. Coleman Andrews, in announcing the new card form Saturday, estimated that 35 million of the 60 million-plus U.S. taxpayers will be eligible to use it. But he said many will choose the longer form 1040 instead.

The 15-line form is a streamlined version of the old 1040A, and Andrews said it could be a preliminary to offering a no-return alternative for the under \$5,000

group. In that event, the Revenue Service would bill the taxpayer on the basis of information supplied by his employer.

Andrews said the four other main types of individual returns have been redesigned to make them more attractive and easier

to understand. The forms will be mailed out starting Dec. 26. The new dead-

line for 1934 returns is next April 15, a month later than in previous years.
