Showers Cover Wide Areas

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Scattered showers and heavier rain covered widely separated sections of the country Tuesday. Showers were reported over a section ranging from the Southern Great Lakes southward into the Mid-Atlantic States. Western portions of Oregon and Washington State had heavier rains. There were cloudy skies over parts of the Central Plains States, but fair skies elsewhere in the country. Earlier reports of rainfall included nearly one inch at Tatoosh Island, Wash.; .59 inch at Cleveland; .39 at Cape Blanco, Ore.; .18 at Buffalo, and .16 at Chicago. Cool weather still hung over the upper Mississippi Valley and the Great Lakes region. Grantsburg, Wis., had a morning low of 22 degrees, and Cadillac, Mich., 21. Duluth, Minn., had 28 and Madison, Wis., 30. Elsewhere, readings were generally from the 40s to the upper 60s. The Ohio River, which had rolled a destructive path down stream from Pittsburgh into West Virginia Sunday, appeared to have spent its force. Swollen by heavy autumn rains earlier, the river Tuesday was hardly above the high water stage in Ohio. The damage it left to property was undetermined.

City Council Hears Jet Base Plans

Klamath Falls has again assured its cooperation in plans to reactivate the airport as a jet interceptor base. At city council Monday night, Mayor Paul Landry read a copy of a letter to Major General Lee B. Washburne, assistant chief of staff for installations, USAF, Washington, D.C., specifying the city's intentions. Based on advice from Air Force officials who met with Naval and Corps of Engineers personnel in Klamath Falls October 8, the city has promised to: (1) Acquire 160 acres of land for extension of runways and for a site for an alert hangar; (2) Provide restrictions easements on 96 acres, 58 adjacent to the ammunition and 38 adjacent to the alert hangar. Both will be done as soon as preliminary contracts for the lease have been signed. In addition, the city will purchase 66 acres for runway extension.
