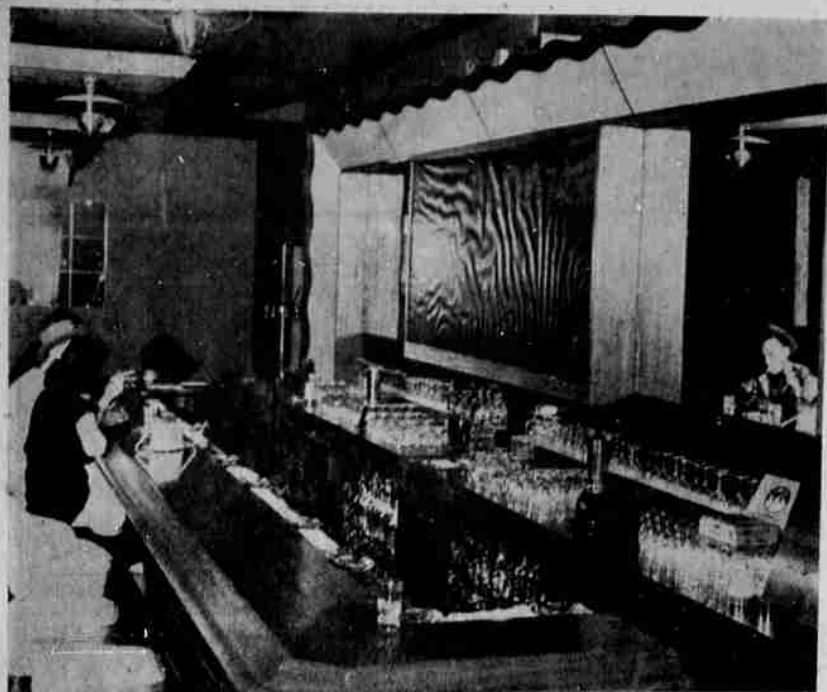

Wimberly Defended By Cordon

VERNONIA (AP)—Sen. Guy Cordon said Monday he did not think Circuit Judge Carl Wimberly violated the State Constitution when he accepted pay for making a study for the federal government.

Drew Pearson, a radio commentator, said in a nationwide broadcast Sunday night that Wimberly got a salary of \$861.10 plus expenses of \$331.71 for making "a pleasant trip to Hawaii some years ago to study statehood," for a committee on which Cordon served.

Pearson said Wimberly at the same time was drawing a salary from the state of Oregon, "yet the State Constitution of Oregon states under article 2, section 10, that state officials cannot hold two lucrative positions simultaneously."

Cordon said his opponents "are trying to find something now in desperation and we shall have more of it, I expect."

He said Wimberly had done an outstanding job in a survey of the judicial system of Hawaii. "The report is on file and its conclusions have never been attacked. The appointment of Judge Wimberly, his investigation and his report were widely publicized at the time. There is nothing secret about it."

"Of course he was paid. I don't see how that could be a violation because the service was to a committee of the United States Senate," Cordon added.

The article of the Constitution which Pearson referred to, states: "No person holding a lucrative office or appointment under the United States or under this state shall be eligible to a seat in the legislative assembly; nor shall any person hold more than one lucrative office at the same time except as in this constitution is expressly permitted..."

It then exempts officers of the militia and low paid postmasters.

Wimberly, a former law partner of Cordon, has refused to comment on Pearson's statement.

Rosenberg Group Faces Tax Lien

NEW YORK (AP)—The Bureau of Internal Revenue has filed a \$24,121 tax lien against the national committee to secure justice in the Rosenberg case.

The committee was formed three years ago to raise money for the defense of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg who later were executed as atom spies for Russia.

The government contends the committee was not a charitable organization and must therefore pay an income tax on all money it received.

In filing the lien Monday, the revenue bureau said the committee collected \$300,000 to \$500,000 between Nov. 1, 1951, to Oct. 31, 1953.

Albany Paper Plant Planned

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—Plans for construction of a multi-million-dollar paper manufacturing plant near Albany were announced Monday by the newly organized Western Kraft Corp.

The plant, in a 20,000 square foot structure, will employ about 100, Ira C. Keller, president, said. It will be located on a 107-acre tract about 3 1/2 miles north of Albany near Millsburg, he said.

The plant will produce Kraft paper—used in making containers—from wood chips which are to be purchased from plywood mills in Lincoln, Benton, Folk, Marion and Linn counties.

Keller, who retired in 1953 from the presidency of the Container Corp. of America, said the plant is scheduled for completion in 1955.

Leukemia Causes Boy's Death

HELENA, Mont. (AP)—Eddie Brooks, the little cowboy, died Tuesday of leukemia—a blood disease.

Eddie, 6, loved cowboys because his daddy, Eddie II, is one. He wanted to see his father, who had been in a rodeo playing New York City, and his idol, Gene Autry.

The two men flew to Eddie's Helena hospital bedside only Monday. The boy smiled wanly at them from his oxygen tent. Too weak to talk or do anything but look longingly at them presented two bright pistols and red bullets.

His mother accepted a picture on which Autry wrote: "To my pal Eddie. Hurry and get well." Then Eddie's mother pulled down the plastic tent flaps and the oxygen was turned on.

Eddie's eyelids closed with memories of his two favorite cowboys.
