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KF Women Voters League's Questionnaire Answered By Five Oregon Candidates

Following their annual custom the Klamath Falls League of Women Voters has sent to each candidate for state office a questionnaire asking the following questions: (1) If tax revenues do not meet the needs of the state, what course of action would you recommend? (2) Who do you believe should build and administer the major power dams in the Northwest? (3) Are you in agreement with the organizational picketing law passed by the last legislature? (4) Do you consider the state board of control an effective means of administration? (5) Do you believe that Oregon public schools need additional tax support? (6) Do you believe state employees' wages should be raised at the present time?

The five candidates for office, Henry Semon, 69, a Democrat running for state representative; Dorothy Lowell, 39, Democrat also running for that office and a third representative, Ed Geary, 61, Republican; Harry Bolvin, 50, Democrat running for the state senate and Oscar Klitredge, 54, a Republican also running for the state senate, have filed the following answers with the League:

Semon: (1) First, try to reduce state expenses to meet state revenue, if that cannot be done reduce the state building program. Sales tax as a last resort. (2) Federal government. (3) Yes, that part of the law that was declared constitutional by the courts. (4) Yes. (5) No more additional state support. School districts to provide additional revenue from the district. (6) All state employees as a group, no. Only those where the yearly turnover is large.

Lowell: (1) I would work to have the "other tax sources" investigated and taxed. (2) I am in favor of federal construction and control of major dams, private construction and control of minor ones. (3) No. (4) No, I do not. (5) With more and more children seeking an education we must have more money from some source. (6) If you mean major employees, no. If minor employees, I would have to investigate further. They must be paid a living wage but I do not have full details on their wages.

Geary: (1) Cut expenditures where practicable. If more money needed submit to the people a bill for additional taxes which would probably have to be a business or sales tax. (2) Believe present federal dams built and being built should remain in hands of the federal government. Believe power companies and PUD's should be allowed to build any dams that they are able to finance. (3) Yes. (4) No. (5) Not at this time. (6) No. If cost of living continues up and inflation starts to again a raise will have to be considered.

Bolvin: (1) I would thoroughly investigate all possible sources of revenue, but I am in favor of limiting the amount of taxes the states can levy on real and personal property. (2) Large multiple purpose dams, such as those on the Columbia River, cannot be

built without federal financing. After the income from the dams has repaid the federal government for its investment, people in the area should have the controlling voice in administration. (3) I understand the constitutionality of this law has been questioned in the courts and not finally decided. I have not had the opportunity to give the matter the study it deserves, however I believe, in principle, where there is no labor dispute there is no right to picket. (4) From my experience as a member of the House of Representatives, the state board of control is not a perfect means of administration, but it is a fairly good answer with respect to management of state institutions. (5) The educational system of Oregon is always in need of money, and will need more tax support as increased enrollments necessitate. However, as costs increase, it may be necessary to obtain new sources of revenue other than property tax for this purpose. (6) For some classifications, yes. As to other classifications I would like to investigate further before committing myself.

Klitredge: (1) I believe a thorough study should be made of the following: Review tax sources and methods to cut waste and inefficiency. See that all are paying their just share and eliminate duplication. Then if the budget is out of balance submit proposed tax measures to the people. (2) The Eisenhower formula of partnership is the most practical and workable solution, in order that the Northwest may obtain the maximum kilowatts for its needs. (3) The law having been declared unconstitutional it would indicate the need for a restudy of the whole question by union, employer and employee groups. (4) The state board of control as it is now constituted is self limiting. I believe the governor as the head of the state should have a greater responsibility in state affairs. (5) Your question does not indicate whether you mean statewide support or local. If the former is intended I will be better able to answer after I have had access to the recently completed study of the basic school support bill. (6) State employees should be paid a wage commensurate to private industry. We should see what the study of state employee's salaries now being made indicates, then we will be better able to adjust the inequities.
