Queen Knights Anthony Eden

LONDON (AP) — Queen Elizabeth II Wednesday knighted Anthony Eden in the Order of the Garter. His elevation to England's order of chivalry came at a time of triumph for the 57-year-old foreign secretary, regarded by most as the ultimate successor to Prime Minister Churchill.

In a 15-minute private ceremony at Buckingham Palace, Eden knelt before his young queen, felt a light tap of a sword upon both shoulders, and heard her say "Arise, Sir Anthony."

Announcement of the knighting came as a surprise. It occurred just before his departure for Paris and the continuing negotiations for putting West German soldiers into the Western defense setup.

Eden has been credited with a leading role in the revival of such efforts after the French torpedoed the European Defense Community treaty.

The honor bestowed upon Eden was a signal sign of his sovereign's personal approval. He joined Churchill, among others, as a member of the Order of the Garter in the ceremony which dates back to the days when knights were in armor and went forth to do battle with banners flying.

Eden is only the seventh commoner to receive the honor since 1700.

A confessed payroll check forger who gave himself up at the county jail was turned over to Seattle authorities Wednesday.

H. D. Stephenson, 31, a Seattle rug cleaner, told Sheriff Murray Britton and City Detective R. N. Adkins that he forged signatures on 11 payroll checks stolen from Northwest Rug & Carpet Company of Seattle. He said the checks were made out for \$77.70 each.

Deputy Sheriff L. W. Miller of Seattle arrived in Klamath Falls Wednesday morning to take Stephenson into custody.

UF Kickoff Starts '55 Campaign

The 1955 United Fund-Red Cross campaign got off to a bang-up start Wednesday morning at a kickoff breakfast at the Winema Hotel.

The kickoff was climaxed with bursting of numerous red balloons, filled with red feathers, symbol of many community united drives. As the shower of feathers fell, workers left the room to begin immediate solicitation towards another successful United Fund-Red Cross drive.

The early morning breakfast was emceed by W. S. McBride this year's campaign chairman. Following recorded martial music, McBride introduced Ernie Taylor, first United Fund Board president, who gave the invocation.

As breakfast was served by candlelight, those present saw a color - sound movie on agencies served by United Fund. Slides were shown by Paul Campbell and explained by Bob Puckett, fund executive secretary, which gave workers instruction on solicitation and prepared them for typical questions they might be asked during their campaign. Puckett also explained contents of workers' packets.

Just before the balloons burst, young people bearing flags and banners of youth organizations benefited by the drive marched in procession to the head table. Representing agencies were George Geary, YMCA; Michael Dixon Red Cross; Tommy Shaw and Lee Ward, Boy Scouts; Sharon Ward, Camp Fire; Sharon Russell,

Girl Scouts; Craig Summers, Salvation Army.

Sumie and Johnny, typical youngsters who have been visiting agencies of the fund and the Red Cross, pulled ribbons which held secured a thermometer on canvas. This will be placed on the First National Bank building to illustrate daily progress of the campaign.
