

Judge Denies Habeas Writ

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg late Wednesday denied a writ of habeas corpus to free a traffic violator from Klamath County Jail.

At the conclusion of a two-hour hearing the judge ruled that Leo Weir, 21-year-old mill worker, had been given a legal sentence of 10 days in jail for violation of the basic rule. State police said Weir was driving 45 miles an hour in a 25 mile zone at Chiloquin.

Defense Attorney U. S. Balentine, who filed the petition for the habeas corpus writ, charged his client was subjected to "coercion and threats" to get him to plead guilty to the traffic charge.

Justice of the Peace Walter Zimmerman of Chiloquin admitted on the witness stand that he had been advised by Police Chief Lewis Jones of Chiloquin to give Weir a jail sentence so he could be questioned about a Merrill safe theft.

State Policeman Harley Hart, who arrested Weir, told the court the youth was driving on the wrong side of the highway and exceeding the speed limit. He said the defendant was advised of all his legal rights and no threats were made against him.

Attorney Balentine called District Attorney Frank Alderson as a witness. Alderson said he had questioned Weir about the Merrill safe theft and would continue to do so whenever he got an opportunity.

Judge Vandenberg said the purpose of habeas corpus was to determine whether a person was unlawfully held in jail. In this case he added the court had been within its rights in imposing a jail sentence.

Weir was remanded to the county jail where he had only two more days to serve.
