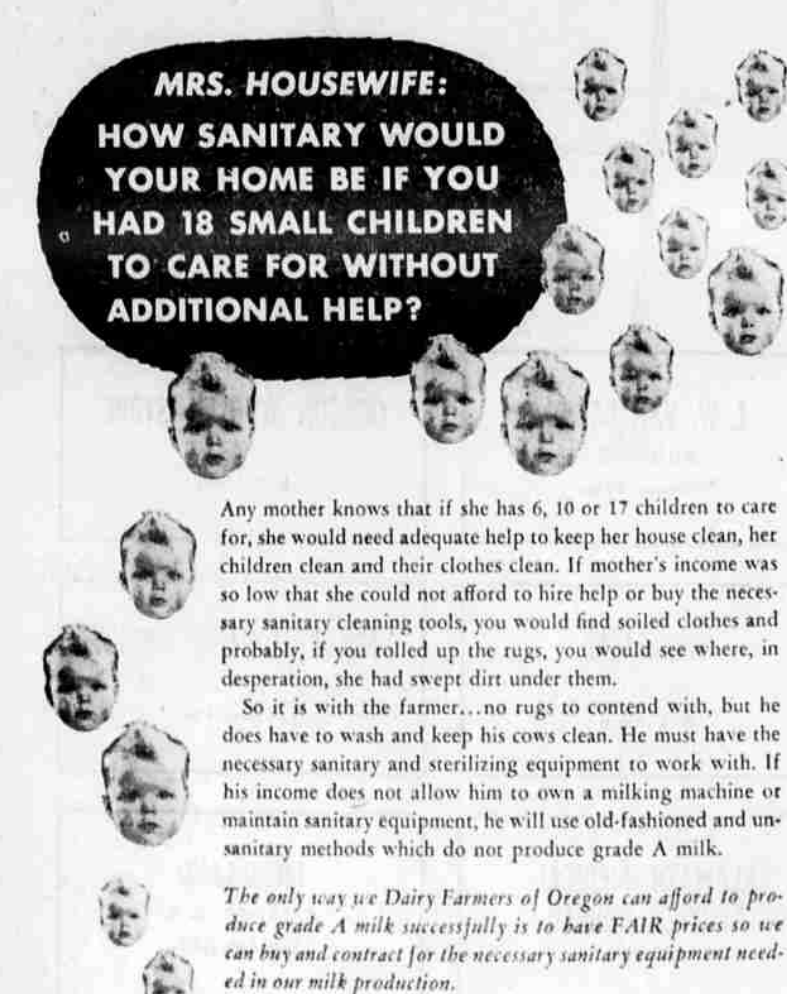

Notice is hereby given that the undersigned, as guardian of the estate of Owen Charles Riddick, a minor, will on and after the 23rd day of November, 1934, at the Court House in Klamath Falls, Oregon, sell at private sale to the highest bidder for cash all the real property owned by said minor, to-wit: A certain lot in Block 24, Township 34 S., Range 11 E., W. 1/4, Section 14 Township 34 S., Range 11 E., W. 1/4, containing approximately 80 acres of merchantable timber with a total estimated stand of 6,500,000 feet B.M. of ponderosa pine and an undetermined volume of lodgepole pine which will not enter into the determination of value bid. Each bid must state the price per acre and the value of the timber to be sold. The value of the timber to be sold will be considered for less than \$33.50 per thousand feet B.M. for ponderosa pine and \$5.75 per thousand feet B.M. for lodgepole pine. A certified check for Ten Thousand (\$10,000.) on a solvent bank, payable to the Bureau of Indian Affairs must accompany each bid. Persons bidding on behalf of partnerships, corporations, or other entities must at the time of bidding submit in writing satisfactory evidence of their authority to do so. The deposit of the successful bidder will be applied as part of the purchase price against timber cut on this unit only or retained as liquidated damages if the bidder shall not execute the contract and furnish satisfactory bond for Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.) within sixty days from acceptance of the bid. The right to waive technical defects and to reject any and all bids is reserved. The contract will specify that all designated timber shall be cut and removed on or about December 31, 1935, and that the contractor shall be responsible for the removal of the timber and the disposal of the same. Spending Hits New Record

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Census Bureau said Thursday spending by state and local governments rose about 7 per cent to a record 33 billion dollars in fiscal years ended during 1933.

This was somewhat less than half the 74 1/2 billion dollars spent by the federal government in fiscal 1933. It indicated total spending by federal, state and local governments in that year of approximately 107 1/2 billion dollars.

The Census Bureau said the increase in spending during fiscal 1933 was about the same for state and local—mostly municipal—governments.

State and local outlays for highways and for education each increased about a billion dollars, but spending for sanitation services, public housing, natural resources, general relief payments, state unemployment benefits and state veterans' bonuses all declined.

The Census Bureau said state and local governments during their fiscal 1933 years collected taxes and other revenues amounting to nearly 30 1/2 billion dollars. Also, they received federal aid amounting to just under 3 billion dollars, nearly all of it to the states. Thus, total revenue to state and local governments including federal aid, came to approximately 33 1/2 billion dollars, slightly more than their total spending. The federal government ran a deficit of nearly 9 1/2 billion dollars in the same year.

US Lowers Visa Permit Barrier

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department has lowered one of the barriers blocking entry of foreigners into the United States.

The department announced that hereafter a visa (entry permit) may be granted to an alien even if he has been convicted of a legal offense in a foreign country—provided that the offense by American standards would be only a misdemeanor rather than a felony.

Officials estimated that many scores of persons have been denied access to the country in the past because of "a single petty offense."
