

Pelicans Trip Reno

Guptill Leads Klamath

RENO — Coach John McGinnis' Klamath Pelicans came from behind in the last quarter to beat the Reno Huskies before a small and half frozen crowd at Foster Field last Saturday afternoon.

Reno scored in the first two minutes of play, after they recovered a fumble on the Pelicans 32. On the sixth play of the series, Reno quarterback Len Morrison ran around his own left end for five yards and the score. Tom Clark's conversion was good giving the Huskies a 7-0 lead.

Reno made another touchdown drive as they packed the mail to the Klamath Falls 23 yard line before being stopped by a strong Pelican defensive line.

The Pelicans failed to threaten in the first half, but when the third period opened, they came out driving with spirit as they recovered a Reno fumble on the Huskies 41 yard line. The Pel offensive machine moved down field on several plays and the drive of 41 yards was climaxed from the five yard line when Larry Yarnell, Pel quarterback, sliced over for the touchdown. Jack Sunitsch's point try was no good, giving the Huskies a 7-6 lead.

A few minutes later, Reno blocked Peppie's punt, and recovered on the Klamath 18 yard line, but again the defense set up by the invading Pels held tight keeping the Huskies at bay.

In the last quarter, it was all Klamath as the Huskies began to weaken under the continual pounding of the Pel offense, and several Reno injuries also helped the Klamath cause.

Klamath pounded at the right side of the Reno line continuously for consistent gains and finally halfback Chuck Guptill broke loose from the Klamath 39 yard line and raced 71 yards down the side lines for the touchdown. A last minute tackle by Huskie Ron Gifford carried both gridders into the end zone by the impact of the tackle, Sunitsch converted giving the Pels a 13-7 edge.

The third Klamath score came later in the period as the Pels marched 57 yards in 13 line rushes by Peppie, Yarnell and Del Fatti. Peppie plunged the final yard for the score. The conversion attempt failed.

Oregon Slaps San Jose

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Too much George Shaw and too many fumbles told the story Saturday in Oregon's 26-7 conquest of San Jose State.

Quarterback Shaw, Oregon's candidate for All America honors, passed to one touchdown, faced 18 yards for another, converted two points after touchdown and generally outmaneuvered the Spartans as the Ducks bounced back from the previous week's defeat by Southern California.

A San Jose fumble recovered on the Spartans' 14-yard line set up Oregon's first tally in the opening period. Two plays later halfback Walt Gaffney took a pitcheout and romped 11 yards to a touchdown.

San Jose halted two Oregon drives in the second period but the Ducks finally scored when tackle Keith Tucker recovered a blocked punt on the San Jose State five and Shaw pitched to end Hal Reeve for six points.

Oregon's third counter came in the fourth period, climaxing a 72-yard drive including a 52-yard pass play from Shaw to halfback Tom Crabtree. Halfback Lloyd Powell plunged over from the eight in three plays.

Shaw's 18-yard sprint at the end of a 52-yard drive wound up the Oregon scoring.

San Jose's only score came in the last period when a bad punt left the ball on the Oregon 36. Reserve quarterback Tony Teresa and Stan Beasley teamed to move the ball to the five and Teresa plunged over.

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San Francisco 49ers Top Lions

San Francisco's power-packed 49ers owned a triple distinction Monday:

1. They are the only undefeated eleven in the National Football League.

2. They are in undisputed possession of first place in the Western Division for the first time this season.

3. They are the only team to defeat the defending champion Detroit Lions in nearly a year.

The 49ers accomplished all three feats in one fell swoop Sunday when they ground out a thrilling 37-31 victory that jarred the Lions out of the lead and into second place.

OVERFLOW
An overflow crowd of 59,000, that jammed San Francisco's Kezar Stadium cheered itself hoarse as the 49ers burst into a 17-0 lead in the first quarter and never were headed although they had to save off a desperate last period rally by Detroit.

Y. A. Tittle, quarterbacking with a cast on his broken left hand, and fullback Hugh McElhenny, running like an unbroken colt, led Frisco's explosive attack.

Tittle passed for two touchdowns and McElhenny reeled off runs of 69 and 34 yards to snap Detroit's 10-game winning streak. The Lions won the last seven games in 1953 after losing 37-24 to Los Angeles last Nov. 1. They won their first three games this year. Only a tie with Los Angeles mars San Francisco's five-game record.

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Toronto Edges Montreal

The Toronto Argonauts, Canada's one-time greatest money football club, cashed in Saturday on a dying-seconda desperation pass that ranks as the most sensational play of the Big Four season. It paid off with a pulsating 30-21 victory over the Montreal Alouettes.

It also recaptured the old magic that rode with Argonaut teams through the years but apparently had deserted the Blues the last two seasons.

Toronto faced one of those win-or-lose situations Saturday. It had to win to stay in the running for a playoff spot.

So the Argonauts played their greatest game in two seasons. They pushed the big tough Als around for nearly 45 minutes, blew an 18-point lead and then won out with a 43-yard touchdown pass off a triple reverse.

The victory left the Argonauts with a bare mathematical chance of a spot in the post-season series with only three games remaining of the 14-game schedule.

Montreal is in first place with a four-point bulge over the Hamilton Tiger Cats, who maintained their four-point edge over Toronto by thumping Ottawa 25-17 Saturday. Any combination of Hamilton victories and Toronto losses adding to two will eliminate the Argonauts.

The 16-game Western Interprovincial Football Union schedule winds up Monday night with three clubs jockeying for first place, but the Calgary Stampeders can start planning for 1955. The Stamps, considered a powerhouse in pre-season guessing, lost their last mathematical chance for a playoff berth Saturday night when the Winnipeg Blue Bombers polished off the British Columbia Lions, 18-0. Edmonton Eskimos jumped into a first-place tie with Saskatchewan by defeating the Roughriders 24-19.

Jo-Jo George passed to Sid Renour for the extra point, ending the scoring in the final game of the league season for the undefeated Panthers.

Merrill threatened in the waning minutes of the game as they drove from their own 30 yard line to the Chiloquin eight before time ran out on their drive.

For Merrill, George Hodges and Bobby Loper were the sparkplugs on offense, and defense, while the bulk of the Chiloquin load rested with Vernon Joe's passing and running, while the line play was sparked by Ray Hill's performance at one of the two tackle positions.
