Morse Blasts Power Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Power costs in the city of Eugene, Ore., would be increased by local construction of Cougar Dam, Sen. Morse of Oregon said Sunday.

Criticizing the federal-local "partnership" proposal for construction of the project, Morse said advocates of the plan were estimating kilowatt hour costs on the basis of 50 years instead of the 30-year amortization period on revenue bonds.

Morse favors federal construction of the Cougar and Green Peter projects in the Willamette River Basin. The "partnership" plan for Cougar, with the Eugene Water and Electric Board installing power features, was approved by the Senate Public Works Committee at the last session but failed to gain the approval of Congress. Morse said cost of "partnership" power to customers at Eugene during the 30-year bond amortization period would be higher than the cost of Bonneville power, even if Bonneville rates were increased 25 per cent.

Local development of the Cougar project would reduce the economies that would result from adding it to the Bonneville system, Morse added.

CAA Officials Probe Wreck

YAKIMA, Wash. (AP) — Civil Aeronautics Administration investigators searched charred plane wreckage Monday for clues to the cause of a crash near here that claimed three lives.

The pilot, Charles Parks, operator of a Wenatchee service station, and Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Bowerman, also of Wenatchee, died when the plane crashed and burned in the hills 10 miles north of here. The tragedy occurred Saturday night but was not discovered until Sunday when three bird hunters found the wreckage.

Dalton Allen, CAA inspector, said preliminary investigation indicated the trio rented the four-place Piper Pacer Saturday night from the Wenatchee Air Service for an overnight trip to Yakima. State and county officers said the plane apparently was attempting to make an emergency landing. It hit near the top of a hill, nosed over, skidded about 85 feet and caught fire. The bodies were cremated.

School District Funds Shared

WASHINGTON (AP) — Washington and Oregon school districts will share in a \$28,431,784 fund earmarked by Commissioner of Education Samuel M. Brownell Sunday to aid in school construction in areas affected by federal defense activities.

The money will provide classroom accommodations for increased enrollments resulting from federal installations. Sunday's allocation brings the total under the program to more than 68 million dollars throughout the nation.

School districts named Sunday included: Washington — Kennewick No. 17, \$289,710; Oregon — District No. 19, Springfield, \$114,500.

Labor Bureau Survey Held

SALEM — The State Bureau of Labor listing 567 establishments in a recent survey of Klamath Falls found five per cent violating the Wage and Hour Act, Labor Commissioner W. E. Kimsey reported today. The Wage and Hour Act sets the standard for employment of women and minors in industry. The Klamath Falls area has shown a ten per cent decrease in violations from the last general survey, states the commissioner.

More than one-half of the current violators were failing to observe two or more provisions of the law, according to the labor report. Illegal overtime often extending into a seven-day week accounted for nine violations and twenty-three firms did not have records which the law requires for establishing compliance with the maximum 8-hour day, 6-day 48-hour week. Labor investigators ordered minors under 18 off their jobs in five establishments until their employers had secured permits for their employment from the Bureau of Labor. Kimsey points out that under child labor regulations the employer is held responsible for securing labor bureau approval of every minor's job before the minor goes to work. Other infractions in the firms checked involved sanitation, employees' rest periods and minimum wages.

Approximately 1300 women and minors were on the payrolls of the Klamath Falls firms. The labor bureau finds the full-time women employes on an average 41 1/2-hour week and minors averaging a 28-hour week. Part-time women workers have an average 23-hour week in the report.

Armistice Day Name Changed

November 11, which has been known as Armistice Day since the end of World War I, will henceforth be Veterans Day. The change in name was made official by Public Law 630, passed by the second session of the 83rd U.S. Congress.

A directive was received today by the local Marine Corps recruiting office to that effect.

Allied Veterans Council members will meet Monday evening, at 7:30, in the VFW Hall, to lay plans for the Klamath Falls Veterans Day observance which will probably include a parade.

Eastern Crash Kills Trainman

PORT HENRY, N.Y. (AP) — The Delaware and Hudson Railroad's Montreal-to-New York City Laurentian Express collided head-on with a barreling 133-car freight train near this Lake Champlain shore village Sunday, killing a trainman and injuring about 50 persons.

D&H officials said the trains were supposed to pass at a siding in Port Henry, a mile north of the wreck. The railroad pressed an investigation to determine why they had not.

None of the Laurentian's 125 passengers was hurt seriously, but some suffered minor cuts and bruises. Six crewmen were hospitalized at nearby Fort Ticonderoga. Killed was Charles Bascue, 57, of Whitehall, trainman on the freight.
