'Piggyback' Service Slated

Southern Pacific's trader-blacker operations, popularly known as "piggyback," will be expanded to include service between San Francisco Bay Area and other central California cities and points in Eastern Oregon, Idaho, Utah and Wyoming, the railroad announced. The new service, effective October 31 with full-scale shipment of general commodities in both directions, provides for interchange of equipment with the Union Pacific railroad.

This is believed to be the first time two railroads have joined in an operation of this kind.
