

Ft. Klamath Church Wins State Award

FORT KLAMATH — For the third consecutive year, the Fort Klamath Community Methodist Church has participated and won in the Oregon Town and Country church improvement project, conducted under the auspices of the Town and Country Committee of the Oregon Council of Churches, with cash awards furnished through the cooperation of the Sears Roebuck Foundation. The 1953-1954 contest marked the eighth annual statewide church improvement project.

Purposes are threefold: to encourage rural church groups in Oregon; to seek improvement in church buildings, equipment and grounds; to improve church programs and cooperative service to the community. The contest is open to any rural church, whether Protestant or Catholic.

The rural churches are divided into three classes — those in open country areas, those in communities of up to 1000 population and churches located in communities of 1,001 to 2500 population. The local church was entered in the second category for all three annual contests in which it has participated.

The local church board, with Raymond S. Loosley as chairman, served as a committee to conduct the project. In which the community assisted. Major improvements entered this year were the addition of new pews and construction of an outdoor barbecue on adjoining church grounds.

In 1952, a certificate of merit was received in recognition of improvements made; in 1953, a cash award of \$75 was given and this year, with a total of 67 churches in all three groups entered and 17 cash awards given, the local church again won fourth place in its division, with a cash award of \$75.

The presentation of awards was made October 18 at the annual conference for town and country church ministers and lay people, held October 18-21 on the Oregon State College campus at Corvallis.

On hand to receive the Fort Klamath church award was Mrs. Raymond S. Loosley, who accepted on behalf of the local Women's Society of Christian Service, of which she is president. She was accompanied by Mrs. Howard Commons and Merrie K. Also making the trip was the pastor of the Fort Klamath and Chiloquin Methodist churches, the Rev. Edmund Stanton, who returned home the latter part of the week after attending the four day conference at Corvallis. Mrs. Loosley, Mrs. Commons and Merrie K. stopped en route home at Pleasant Hill to visit Mr. and Mrs. Hansford T. (Mike) Williams and family, former residents. Mrs. Williams was one of the moving spirits in all three contests in which the Fort Klamath church took a part, and much credit is due her for the success of the local project.

Atheist Granted Citizen Hearing

PORTLAND (AP) — A young atheist, who was denied citizenship because he refused to say "so help me God" when taking the citizenship oath, will be granted a new hearing on his case in Portland Dec. 6.

The youth, Wladyslaw Plywacki, is a student at Oregon State College. A federal judge in Hawaii withheld citizenship two years ago because he would not repeat the entire oath.

The case was appealed to the federal district court which overruled the Hawaii decision. The district court transferred the case to Oregon jurisdiction.

Leroy Schilling, a clerk for the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service here, said Monday that agency was trying to find out if Plywacki could be granted citizenship by affirming the oath instead of by invoking God.

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Dulles Planned Television Joke

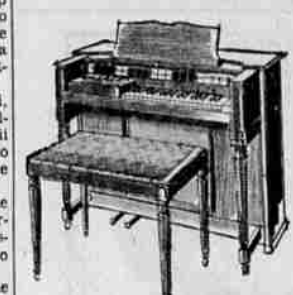
WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dulles confided to President Eisenhower after Monday night's televised and broadcast cabinet meeting that he had thought about playing a joke on Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey.

At one point in Dulles' report on the new European defense alliance, expense-conscious Humphrey interrupted to ask how much it was going to cost the United States.

Dulles replied "It isn't going to cost us a nickel extra." Afterward, Dulles let it out in chatting with the President that Humphrey's question was prearranged. And then Dulles told Eisenhower about the joke he said he had considered but didn't pull.

"When Humphrey asked how much it was going to cost, I was going to say six billion dollars. Then he was going to faint and we were going to carry him out in front of everybody."

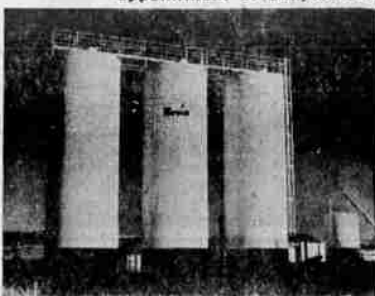
