U. S. Senator Visits Molotov

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov received Sen. Margaret Chase Smith (R-Maine) Tuesday at her request.

The interview lasted about an hour. Without making any statement to newsmen, Sen. Smith then drove to the British Embassy to lunch with Ambassador Sir William Hayter and Lady Hayter.

Mrs. Smith's administrative assistant, William C. Lewis, who was present at the interview, said later the question of the senator's requested interview with Premier Malenkov did not come up. He declined to outline the discussion, even in general terms.

LONDON (AP) — Japanese Premier Shigeru Yoshida said Tuesday the loss of traditional markets in China has hurt his nation's economy, but that his government has "no intention whatsoever" of recognizing the Peiping regime.

Northwest Fish Study To Be Held

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP) — Future development of fisheries resources in the North Pacific will come in for special study during the current meeting here of the International North Pacific Fisheries Commission.

Dr. Stewart Bates of Ottawa, deputy minister of fisheries and commission chairman, told the Canadian, United States and Japanese delegations Monday that future development of fisheries re-

sources in the North Pacific depends largely on a scientific research program to be undertaken by the three countries.

"This technical gathering," Dr. Bates said, "will deal with all species of fish in the North Pacific

and the Bering Sea, where both Japan and the U. S. have big interests."

He said the meeting will be chiefly concerned with the problem of fishing restrictions and the organization of scientific facts to

justify such restrictions. The commission, formed in Washington, D. C., last year, will consider a committee report on biology and research at its sessions Wednesday.

In welcoming delegates Monday, Fisheries Minister James Sinclair

announced the establishment of a new management committee to seek means of increasing the annual commercial yield of salmon originating in the Skeena River system of Northern British Colum-

bia. The committee's operations will be patterned along the lines of the International Pacific Salmon Fisheries Commission which successfully undertook rehabilitation work on the Fraser River system.

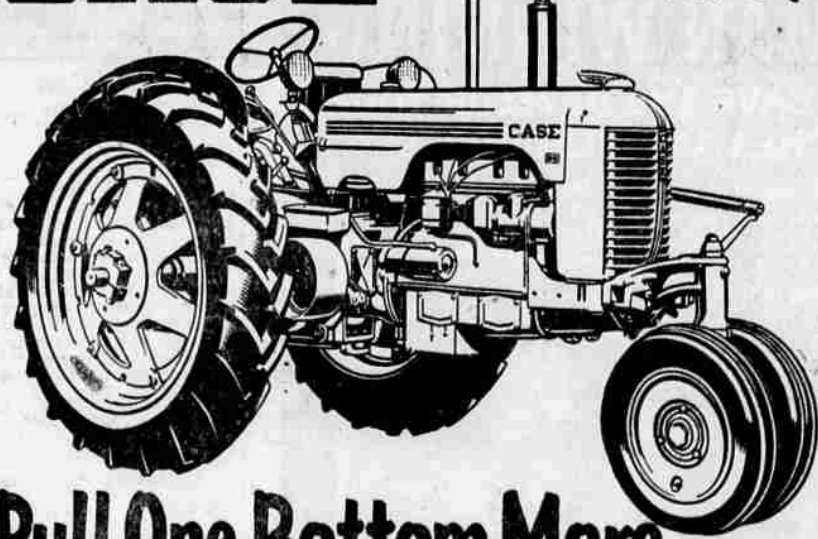
