

Egypt Chief Shot At By Terrorists

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt (AP)—A widespread roundup of leaders of the fanatical Moslem Brotherhood was reported under way today on the basis of an apparent assassination attempt against Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser.

Eight deliberately spaced pistol shots rang out last night while Nasser addressed a big rally celebrating the signing of the British-Egyptian agreement on the Suez Canal Zone. Nasser was not hurt. He shouted to the startled crowd that the shots were a "criminal's attempt against my life."

Four men arrested as suspects in the shooting were identified as members of the brotherhood, which has been conducting an underground campaign against the Suez settlement, which they charge does not clear the British completely out of Egypt.

In Cairo, streetcars and buses were at a standstill this morning, apparently as the result of a demonstration of union workers against the incident. Thousands of persons going to work were stranded.

There was no comment from the government on reports that security police were rounding up brotherhood members but dozens of persons in the Imbaba district of Cairo, home of one of the four

shots were taken into custody for questioning. In the incident last night in Alexandria's Liberation Square, an electric light bulb near the Premier was shattered by one bullet and two minor officials were cut by flying glass.

The 39-year-old Nasser continued his speech and two hours later the Egyptian state broadcasting system rebroadcast the address. Listeners could hear the shots and Nasser's emotion-packed shouts to the crowd.

"Let them kill me," he cried. "I have already established freedom, dignity and pride in Egypt. My blood is for you. My life is for you. After the criminal's attempt against my life, I assure you that my life is yours and will be spent for you. . . I am from you and for you."

Eyewitnesses said Nasser's bodyguards attempted to persuade the Premier to stop his speech, but he insisted on continuing.

Marilyn To Tell Story

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—Marilyn Monroe is scheduled to appear in divorce court today to tell what wrecked her nine-month marriage to baseball's Joe DiMaggio.

Hollywood's most famous attorney, Jerry Giesler, will usher the blonde actress into the Superior Court of Judge Orlando Rhodes and lead her through the divorce proceedings. He expected the hearing on the suit, which is brought on grounds of mental cruelty, to last about 20 minutes.

The wedding took place in another courtroom and was even speedier. It was performed last Jan. 14 by Municipal Judge Charles S. Peery in San Francisco. After a Korean honeymoon and a seemingly idyllic life in Hollywood, Marilyn dropped a bombshell Oct. 4 by announcing the marriage was finished.

Two days later, the one time Yankee clipper left their Beverly Hills cottage, telling the press he was heading for San Francisco. Since then Marilyn has been working on her current picture "The Seven Year Itch." Others on the set report she has been in good spirits. She had a day off yesterday to prepare for today's ordeal and won't have to report back to the studio until tomorrow.

Giesler said there would be no alimony request nor community property division. He said the divorce apparently will be granted by default, since he has not heard from DiMaggio. Joe did not file an answer to her suit.

US Navy Patrol Planes Missing

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—Two antisubmarine patrol planes from the Norfolk Naval Air Station were reported missing early today some 20 miles off the Virginia coast. They carried combined crews of six.

Coast Guard and Navy air-sea rescue teams were sent into the area.

The naval air station said the two propeller-driven patrol planes had only enough fuel to last until midnight last night. They had been due to return from patrol at 10 p.m. No radio distress signals had been heard at any time.

Young Mother Dies From Polio

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP)—A 25-year-old Powell, Wyo., mother, who gave birth to a daughter here last Thursday, died yesterday of bulbar polio.

Mrs. Donald Singer, paralyzed in both legs and an arm, was brought here and placed in an iron lung Oct. 19. Two days later her baby was delivered by Caesarean section.

The infant is being cared for in an incubator.

DELEGATE LONDON (AP)—Anthony Nutting, minister of state for foreign affairs, will replace Selwyn Lloyd as head of the British delegation to the United Nations, the foreign office announced Wednesday.
