Judge Orders Probation

Clarence (Doodles) Strode, 22-year-old ex-convict, who police say was cashing bogus checks before he could read and write, was placed on five years probation Thursday by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Judge Vandenberg took the action on recommendation of Deputy District Attorney Robert Kerr. Strode was returned to Klamath County recently from Oregon State Prison where he served 18 months on a check charge in Deschutes County.

The Deschutes offense occurred while he was on probation for car theft from Klamath County.

"As far as I can determine," Judge Vandenberg said, "you have had your chance. You were passing bad checks at age 16. At that time you couldn't read and write. You left this court and never returned to the probation officers. Two years later you committed another crime."

"On the district attorney's recommendation, and for that reason only, I am going to give you another chance by placing you again on five years probation."

Strode told the court while he was in Oregon State Prison he learned to read and write. Before that he said friends wrote bogus checks for him to pass.

"I didn't have sense enough to go to school," he said. "I know better now."

Red Chinese Visit Japan

TOKYO (AP) — Nearly 100 wildly waving Chinese Communist flags blossomed at Haneda International Airport, which doubles as a U. S. airbase, Thursday night when three Chinese Red Cross officials arrived from Peiping via Hong Kong.

The three are the vanguard of a 10-man delegation invited by the Japanese Red Cross—the first official Chinese Communist visit to Japan since the Reds took China in 1949. Their leader, Red Cross President Mrs. Li Teh-Chuan, is due Saturday afternoon.

Shouting and flag-waving by pro-Red Chinese and Japanese newcomers at the airport, a quiet demonstration by Chinese Nationalist sympathizers at a roadside bridge and a serene by leftist students outside a hotel marked an otherwise orderly arrival.

However, hundreds of policemen were posted at the airport, along the route to Tokyo and outside the Imperial Hotel to check possible violence. Some carried neutralizing chemicals to be used in event of acid-throwing, a tactic Japanese Communists used several years ago.

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Trio Opens KF Concert, Fall Season

The Klamath Falls Community began another concert season with the presentation Wednesday evening in the Pelican Theater of the Columbia Bel Canto Trio.

The opening night performance featured Pierrette Alaire, soprano; Leopold Simoneau, tenor and Theodor Uppman, baritone, accompanied by Allen Rogiers at the piano.

The competitive spirit of concert artists and operatic stars which might cause an attempt to out-do the other wasn't expressed by these three; in fact, the weakest parts of the program for this listener were the trios. Solos and each combination of singers in duets were magnificent.

Pierrette Alaire was captivating in the aria "O Star That Guidest My Fervent Love" from Donizetti's Linda di Chamounix. Her fascinating blue eyes gave added expression to the waiting love song.

Leopold Simoneau, certainly one of the most assured tenors, was vibrantly melodious, especially in the moving Mozart aria "To My Beloved" from Don Giovanni and Verdi's "This One or That One" from Rigoletto. He was superb, also, with Theodor Uppman in the well-known Rossini and Puccini duets, from the Barber of Seville and La Boheme.

Uppman, at ease with any selection, was at his best in the spontaneous and charming aria, "Ladies, That's the Way You Flirt," from Mozart's Così fan tutte.

The program itself was expertly chosen to include many all-time favorites, Verdi, Puccini, Mozart and Rossini, and planned to demonstrate to the utmost the talents and abilities of the three singers.
