Russian Police Blamed For Indignities By US Envoy

 WASHINGTON (AP)—U. S. diplomats in Moscow are reported to have been subjected to a series of "personal indignities" by Soviet police prior to the latest incident involving two American Embassy wives.

This is understood to be the reason U.S. Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen has moved to seek the personal intervention of Foreign Minister Molotov. Essentially, Bohlen is concerned to obtain greater respect for the rights of his embassy staff and greater regard for their safety.

State Department officials declined to discuss previous incidents involving diplomatic immunity but it was learned that there has been a series of these minor clashes.

Most, if not all, were said to stem from picture taking by Americans. Cameras have been seized, film confiscated and in some instances diplomats have been detained even though they were photographing subjects permissible under Russian regulations.

The most recent incident came Monday morning when Mrs. Karl E. Sommerlatte, wife of the second secretary in the embassy, and Mrs. Houston Bliff, wife of the assistant naval attaché, carried a camera on a walk near the U.S. Embassy in Moscow.

Washington and Moscow accounts differ as to what happened.

The Washington version: The two women asked permission to photograph some Russian women. When this permission was refused, a man suggested that they should go to a nearby workers club where there was photographic material they would be interested in. At the club two Soviet secret police

agents forcibly prevented them from leaving although both presented diplomatic identification. Mrs. Sommerlatte and Mrs. Bliff put up a fight to get away. After about an hour they were rescued by Sommerlatte.

The Soviet version: The two women had sought to take a picture of some Russian children against a background where repairs were under way and there was considerable rubble. The father of one of the children protested having his daughter's picture taken against such a background. He said a worker invited the women to a factory club nearby, and the worker tried to tell Mrs. Sommerlatte of her "improper act," at which point she hit him in the face and "brutally pushed away" a woman nearby. Moscow also said that when Sommerlatte arrived he "allowed himself a number of tactless remarks about the Soviet Union."

Bohlen and the Soviet foreign minister exchanged protests over the affair and the Foreign Ministry declared Mrs. Sommerlatte's persona non grata—that is, personally unacceptable.

Persons familiar with conditions in Moscow say the number of recent incidents appears in part to stem from a superficial liberalization of Russian regulations about what foreigners may do there.

The Malenkov government's relaxation of many restrictions has encouraged Americans to travel about and make pictures in unrestricted areas. At the same time the Soviets have repeatedly warned their people, particularly Communist party members, to be on the alert for spies and people intent on stealing Soviet secrets. In the American view this appears to have stirred up considerable misplaced zeal on the part of minor police authorities and many ordinary citizens.

Korean Finances Probe Ordered

SEOUL (AP)—President Syngman Rhee today ordered his Cabinet to make "a thorough investigation" of alleged improper procedures involving South Korean government financial officials.

A National Assembly investigating committee reported last Tuesday that former Prime Minister and Finance Minister Paik Too Chin and other financial officials used "favoritism and pressure" to obtain improper loans for their friends.

Paik now is economic coordinator handling the U.S. aid program. He called the report "a political intrigue schemed by a group of ambitious men."

SEOUL (AP)—Gasoline leaking from a U.S. Army pipeline was ignited by a discarded match today and the resulting flash blaze killed seven Koreans and injured 32, the national police reported.

Defense Efforts Upsurge Seen

WASHINGTON (AP)—Four top ranking defense officials returned from Europe Wednesday and reported that the newly concluded accords to enlist Germany in the West's lineup have touched off an upsurge in mutual defense efforts.

Deputy Defense Secretary Robert Anderson told newsmen he had conferred with military leaders of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization powers and found they are "facing up to the realities and the possibilities of aggression."

The upsurge, said Anderson, appears to be economic as well as military.

Anderson commented that the American officials were in the Mediterranean soon after the Yugoslavian-Italian agreement on the long disputed Trieste problem which was followed by withdrawal of American occupation troops. He said there was "a lot of enthusiasm out of the Trieste matter."

Returning with Anderson, who had been in Europe for 23 days were Asst. Secretaries H. Struve Hensel, Fred A. Seaton and Franklin G. Floete.

Silver Dollar Shipment Made

DENVER (AP)—Mrs. Alma Schneider, director of the U.S. Mint here, announced about 2 1/2 million dollars worth of silver coins were shipped out yesterday in a heavily guarded truck convoy.

The destination was secret because "we certainly don't want to take any chances on hijacking," she said.
