Mike Dillavou, at the time this was written, is resting comfortably in a Lakeview hospital where he was taken Thursday evening, October 21, after he sustained a gunshot wound in his right upper leg while hunting for deer in the Bailey Flats area six miles north of Bly. Dillavou, his wife Kay, and Arlene Brallier, a teacher of Bly High whose home is in Klamath Falls, were hunting together. About 5:30 Miss Brallier sighted a deer on the busy flats where the deer were numerous, fired and accidentally hit Mike Dillavou. Kay stayed with her husband while her companion went to seek help. A short distance from the accident she ran into Dillavou's parents Mr. and Mrs. Max Dillavou who were also hunting in the area. Dillavou's father, three passing hunters, told them to go to Bly and call the Lakeview Disaster Car, from his garage. After seeing that his son was alright he hurried into Bly to get Herb Hadley, first aid man for the US Forestry service. Hadley applied first aid to the wounded man, covered him well with blankets, and built a campfire while awaiting the arrival of the ambulance.

About seven o'clock the Disaster car with sirens blaring drove into the Bly Forest Service to ask directions. This alerted most of the townspeople many of them taking off in their cars in the direction the ambulance went to have a look-see. Ted Hyde whose land lies in Section 10 where the accident occurred, notified State Police who put up a road block to prevent

any more cars from congesting traffic.

Dr. Streaky of Lakeview who accompanied the disaster car pronounced it a flesh wound and not serious. The gun was fired from 143 feet.
