

Grants Pass Topples Pelicans, 23-6

Miami U. Continues Fast Pace

This Miami football team of Coach Andy Gustafson is all fired up with no place to go.

The NCAA's recent disciplinary order against the Florida school, banning post-season competition, puts a pretty sturdy roadblock between Miami and a bowl bid. And the way the Hurricanes are going, it looks like that order may be the only device capable of stopping Miami this season.

Miami, a newcomer at the No. 19 spot in this week's Associated Press poll after defeating Maryland, exploded in all directions for its sixth victory of the season last night, humiliating Fordham's Rams 75-7.

HIGHEST

It was the highest score ever run up by a Miami team and more than made up for a 20-0 upset the Rams perpetrated against the Hurricanes last season in New York's Polo Grounds.

The score was 41-0 at the half as the Hurricanes got off to a good start on a 14-play drive. Nine different ball carriers did the scoring with Gordon Malloy, Miami's All-America candidate, and Sam Scarone each scoring twice. In all, Miami rolled to 373 yards rushing and added 98 yards on three of five pass attempts.

The Hurricanes weren't completely wrapped up in offense, however. Miami's defense rocked the Rams for a minus 2 yards rushing.

STREAK

In other Friday action that got another big college weekend under way, Marquette defeated Detroit 14-13, the Citadel upset Wofford's six-game winning streak 14-13, Richmond knocked off George Washington 7-0 and Denver defeated New Mexico 14-6.

With Miami already safely home, it's up to Ohio State, Oklahoma, UCLA and the rest of the top 10 to do as well today. Ohio's Buckeyes, the No. 1 team, look to have an easy opponent in Northwestern. An OSU victory coupled with a Michigan success against Indiana would bring the two Big Ten leaders another step closer to a title-Rose Bowl meeting Nov. 20.

Oklahoma, with quarterback Jim Harris and end Carl Allison, weakened by the flu, has a job on its hands with Colorado, a fellow Big Seven member that was looking to the No. 2 Sooners too soon last week and lost to Nebraska. Another big game in the Big Seven pairs Missouri and Nebraska, both hot on the Orange Bowl trail since Oklahoma is ineligible.

NOT SO EASY

UCLA, No. 3, has a not-so-easy opponent in California, since the Bears still have a Rose Bowl trip in mind. The Uclans, toast of the coast, can't make the big bowl visit again this season.

Southern California, the other coast bowl hopeful, plays Oregon State.

The No. 4 team, Arkansas, runs into Texas A & M in search of its sixth straight victory.

Army, No. 5, tries for victory No. 5 since its opening defeat to South Carolina and ought to find it against Virginia. The other service team, Navy, squares off against Notre Dame, the No. 6 team.

West Virginia's unbeaten Mountaineers, listed No. 7, have what may be the toughest job in the top 10. They face up-and-coming Pittsburgh. Eighth-ranked Wisconsin plays Iowa and Purdue, No. 8, in Illinois.

Fumbles Hurt Pels In Final Game Loss

Fumbleitis struck a wicked blow at the Klamath Falls Pelicans last night on Modoc Field before a jam-packed crowd of high school grid fans, as the red and white Pels dropped a 23-6 battle to the Grants Pass Cavemen.

Coach Mel Ingram's Cavemen took advantage of every break they could lay their hands on during the 45 minute game, and made a few of their own to make it five straight wins over the Pels in district 6 competition.

Although outgained in the net yardage department, and strictly plowed-under in the first-down end

Yarnell, Gerald Del Fatti and People took turns in moving the ball to the Cavemen's 13 yard line, but a clipping penalty against Klamath set the ball on the Grants Pass 28 yard line, setting the stage for the most spectacular play of the game.

Yarnell dropped back looking for a receiver and tossed an aerial to end Bill Baderek on the three yard line, where the junior end made an unbelievable catch before falling to the turf on the one. A line plunge by People failed, but the second try off-tackle by the Pels' junior halfback was good for the TD. Jack Sunitsch's try for point kick was no good giving Grants Pass a 7-0 edge.

The rest of the scoring was done in the third period of the district game as Grants Pass took advantage of two Klamath Falls' fumbles and turn them into touchdowns.

Grants Pass kicked off to the Pelicans to open the last half and the Pels started what looked like a possible march from their own 40 yard line. Yarnell, Chuck Gupitill and Del Fatti carried to the Cavemen's 41 yard line where the Pels' quarterback was hit hard at the line of scrimmage and the football rolled loose on the ground where Grants Pass fullback Lloyd Zimm picked up the rolling pigskin and rambled 57 yards for a touchdown. Again Drews' kick was good sending the scoreboard figures to a 14-6 margin.

AWAKE

It was only a few minutes later when the Pels, after picking up three first downs, fumbled again and Grants Pass was awake and on top of the loose ball as fast as a wind from Hurricane Hazel.

With the ball resting on the Grants Pass 47 yard line, Drews picked his way one yard to the 46 and on the next play, Zimm took a pitchout from quarterback Chuck Newell and headed down field before being stopped on the Klamath 19 yard line. A gallop of 34 yards.

This time Nevil handed to Drews on a quick opener, the same play that hurt Klamath last year, only with Bobby Woods doing the carrying, who in turn scampered into the end zone for a score. His third try for point kick was good sending the margin soaring to 21-6 in favor of the visitors from the valley.

A stiff defensive battle shaped in the early second of the fourth and final quarter for both squads, as the Cavemen recovered another Pelican fumble and moved to the Pelicans' one yard line before being held on downs by an immovable Klamath line.

SMOTHERED

On the first play from scrimmage, People took a hand off from Yarnell and was smothered behind the goal line by a whole host of blue-jerseyed Cavemen with Mel Drews on the bottom of the pile to add another two points to the Cavemen's score, making it 23-6.

Throughout the remaining minutes of the fourth quarter, it was battle of exchanging punts and holding each other for no gain, as both clubs played hard and steadfastly defensive ball.

Individual statistic leaders for the victorious Cavemen were Zimm who garnered 70 yards, not including the 57 yard gallop with the loose ball, and Drews who collected 45 yards. Klamath's Penny rolled up the high for both teams with his total of 79 yards, while Yarnell pounded out a net yardage total of 30, after being thrown for losses totaling 29 yards.

This conference and traditional battle, closed out the season for the local high school gridder with a 4-3 win loss record with McGinnis and two assistants Harry Russell, line mentor and Gerald Bevans, backfield boss, directing the Pels, while Ingram's Cavemen have another game with Marshfield next weekend.

Sal Perea Wins Cal Ring Crown

SAN DIEGO (U) — Sal Perea, 157, veteran San Francisco boxer, scored a fourth round technical knockout over Willie Vaughn, 139, Los Angeles, and won the California middleweight championship Friday night.

Vaughn was not permitted to continue in the fifth because of a laceration on his left eye. It extended an inch and a half. His manager, Charley Greco, entered a protest, claiming it was a butt and not a punch that caused the cut.

"I'm going to protest it, and if my boy was ahead he earned a win, and if Perea was ahead we get a technical draw," said Greco.

Clayton Fry, state athletic commissioner, was in the crowd. He told Greco referee Hal Rickard's decision was final.

The damage occurred in the late stage of the fourth when Perea shook Vaughn with a hard right to the head and forced Willie to go into a clinch. Perea swarmed in and during the volleying the cut occurred.

Mack Blasts League

PHILADELPHIA (U) — Connie Mack blasted the American League for rejecting the bid of eight Philadelphia to buy control of his beloved Athletics and he believed the team will play in Kansas City in 1955.

The 91-year-old president of the Athletics said last night that "the Kansas City setup wants the club. Everything works to that end. No matter what the Macks say or do, the answer will still be Kansas City, of course."

REUNAROUND

Mr. Baseball, as he is known to fans the world over, said American League club owners just didn't want the Philadelphia syndicate to have the team. "They simply didn't want those men to have the club. It's a turnaround with an awful lot of pressure to take the A's to Kansas City."

"They wouldn't get away with that stuff on me. They'd have to show me," said baseball's elder statesman. He said if he were a member of the syndicate he would "demand" to know the objection to the group.

In an open letter to the Philadelphia fans read to newsmen by his wife, Katherine, the grand old man of baseball not only lashed out at the league, but rebuked his son, Roy, key man in the many proposed deals to decide the fate of the bankrupt franchise.

"He (Roy) has been behind everything since May, telling everything one thing and doing something else," said Mack.

On the other hand, Connie had nothing but praise for his son, Earle, the other of the three owners of the team. "I don't think it's any fault of Earle's. He's been wonderful about everything."

Referring again to the local syndicate, Mack said:

"These good businessmen have the money and want the club but they (league owners) who voted against approval gave the answer that they weren't interested."

"Isn't that dressing it up a bit? he asked. 'Are we back in the first grade?'

Mack rebuffed a hint by Roy that the Mack family might operate the team in Philadelphia next year. "There isn't a chance of the family operating in Philadelphia next season," he said.

DIED LEGALLY

The Philadelphia syndicate died legally yesterday afternoon when T. R. Hanft, one of the group, received from a midcity bank the \$1,400,000 that had been held in escrow for payment to the Macks.

At the same time, J. Channing Ellery, team counsel, took back the club stock certificates held in the same bank.

Roy Mack yesterday denied a report that he had voted against the syndicate in the ballot that barred the sale to the group.

Asked what his next step would be, Roy said: "Guess we'll have to operate as best we can. We'll have a meeting Monday or Tuesday and talk things over. I am truly disappointed in the deal with the Philadelphia syndicate that got through."

As for the syndicate, most of its members were talking for publication. John Criscione, automobile dealer and one of the eight, expressed the sentiment of the majority when he said "I have good reason to believe that someone handed us a doublecross."

Black Tornadoes Fall Before Marshfield '11'

Four more teams jumped into the class 1-A Oregon state high school football playoffs Friday night, joining Medford and Pendleton, but Corvallis postponed South Salem's expected district 8 title with a surprising 6-0 tie. South Salem, top-ranked prep team in Oregon, had won seven previous games.

Marshfield kept its perfect record by downing Medford 28-0 in a feature non-district game at Coos Bay. It was the eighth consecutive victory for Marshfield, ranked No. 2 in the Associated Press poll and favored to win the district 5 playoff spot.

TIES

Winning district titles Friday night were Jefferson and Lincoln of Portland, Milwaukie and Beaverton.

Jefferson captured the Portland league championship and a district 1 playoff berth with a 27-7 victory over runnerup Lincoln. Jefferson caught fire in the final period, scoring three touchdowns. Lincoln will represent district 2 in the playoffs.

Milwaukie, No. 7 in the poll, defeated Tillamook 27-13 to wrap up the district 3 title. It will be Milwaukie's first appearance in the playoffs since 1942.

Beaverton rolled up eight touchdowns and a safety in its 57-7 rout of Newberg in district 4 action, while McMinnville upset Forest Grove, 20-14. This combination gave Beaverton the title.

KEY GAME

The district 5 Bend-Eugene game Saturday night is the key in district 5. If Eugene wins, Marshfield will be assured at least a tie for district honors. A North Bend victory would set the stage for a deciding game next Friday between Marshfield and North Bend.

In district 6, Medford already has won the title. Grants Pass defeated Klamath Falls 23-6 Friday night to take runnerup honors. "Pendleton, No. 5 in the poll, beat Clatskanie, Wash., 13-6, to remain undefeated in eight games. Pendleton has clinched the district 7 playoff spot and can even lose to Milton-Freewater next week.

The district 8 race will be decided next week when South Salem meets North Salem, which lost to Albany 41-18. South Salem could have won the title by beating Corvallis.

Reedport and Dallas joined Prineville in the class 2-A playoffs with Friday night victories. Reedport won the district 2 crown by beating Siuslaw, 42-7, and Dallas

defeated Canby 33-7 to win the district 4 spot.

Prineville, the only 2-A school in the poll, nosed out Roseburg 8-7 in a non-district game. Roseburg is a class 1-A team. Prineville will represent district 8 in the state playoffs.

St. Helens beat Scappoose 30-0 and won the right to meet Lake Oswego for the district 1 title next week.

Central of Monmouth-Independence clinched a tie for the district 3 title by whipping Salem Academy 33-7. Serra of Salem meets Clayton Saturday, and a Serra victory would give Central the title. Otherwise Central must beat Serra next week.

Junction City's 23-6 win over Willamette of Eugene gave Junction City a tie for district 5 honors, but Pleasant Hill and Oakridge are still in the running.

Coquille plays Ashland for the district 6 crown next week. Coquille won its sub-district title by beating Myrtle Point 27-0.

The Vale-Ontario game Nov. 5 at Ontario will decide the district 7 entrant.

Peoria, Brazil Remain Unbeaten

RIO DE JANEIRO (U) — The United States and Brazil were the only unbeaten teams Saturday in the world basketball tournaments.

The Peoria (Ill.) Caterpillars, representing the U. S., and Brazil both won their third straight in the round-robin final round Friday.

The Caterpillars subdued a stubborn Uruguay team whose fast-breaking tactics surprised the Americans. Peoria, leading at halftime 30-25, withstood a final period surge by Uruguay to win 44-39. B. H. Brown, former Kansas luminary, topped the Caterpillars with 15 points.

Brazil whipped Canada 82-66 to hand the Canadians their first setback in the final round. Canada's record in the round-robin is 2-1.

The Caterpillars hope to continue their winning ways Saturday at the expense of Canada and take over undisputed possession of first place in the standings. Each victory counts two points and the U. S. can move two points in front of Brazil, which is idle Saturday.

The Philippines, which beat China 46-38 Friday, meets Israel and China plays France in other games Saturday.

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
