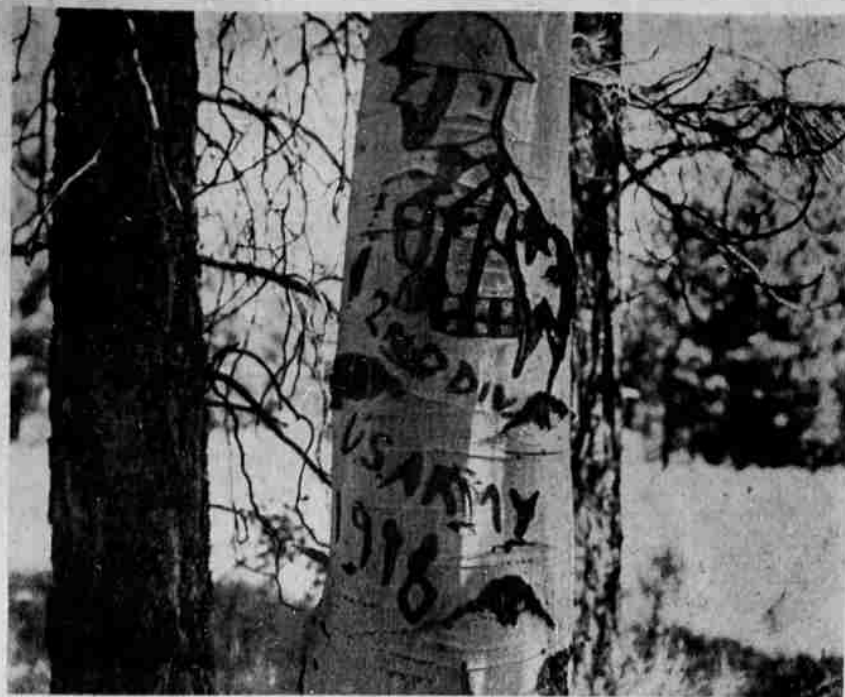

Commission Plans U.N. Arms Talks

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The U.N. Disarmament Commission began today the task of setting up five-power arms talks. There was mounting speculation over who will represent the United States in the ticklish negotiations aimed at controlling atomic and hydrogen weapons.

The way was cleared for the talks earlier this week when the 60-Nation Political Committee gave the plan unanimous approval.

The plan, a rare accord, was sponsored by Russia and four Western nations. Assembly approval was seen as a virtual certainty sometime next week.

The co-sponsors of the resolution—Britain, France, Russia, the United States and Canada—already have run into difficulty in arranging the talks. The United States is reported flatly opposed to French efforts to get the parley going now.

The State Department is said to have no one immediately available who is qualified to discuss the complex disarmament question. Reliable sources said, however, Morehead Patterson, New York industrialist who represented the United States at previous disarmament talks in London last spring, might be available if the parley is held over until the first of the year.

The sources said Patterson is still deeply interested in the arms issue and would like to carry on the task. With the background he absorbed in the London negotiations, the sources added, Patterson would be an outstanding choice to represent the United States in the pending talks.

Except for France, who will undoubtedly be represented by her disarmament expert, Jules Moch, there has been no indication who will speak for the other powers.

The subcommittee is expected to discuss these main proposals:

1. Russia's new plan for step by step disarmament accompanied by elimination of atomic and hydrogen weapons.

2. The British-French proposals on which the Soviet scheme is partly based. It calls for outlawing atomic weapons except for defense against aggression.

3. A U.S. proposal which would set up strong control measures to enforce disarmament. The Russians already have served notice they will never agree to establishing a control organ armed with powers they contend belong only to the U.N. Security Council.

Russia's charges of U.S. aggression against Communist China were due for another airing next Tuesday when the U.N. Steering Committee resumes consideration of the two Soviet complaints.

The Russians want the Steering Committee to place on the Assembly's current agenda:

1. Russia's charges that Nationalist China—with U.S. connivance—has made piratical attacks on shipping bound for the Communist Chinese mainland.

2. Russia claims that the United States is guilty of aggression in the area around Formosa and the

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Hunt Report Cards Asked

Now that many hunters have completed their hunting for the year, it comes time to dig down for that post card sized piece of paper called hunter report card.

The game commission is asking all hunters to send in their report cards so that an accurate count and complete details of the deer kill for this year can be obtained.

In case the card has been lost, a post card containing the pertinent information will suffice.

If a regular post card is used, it should have the following information: number of days hunted, type of deer killed (buck, doe, fawn), number of points on each antler hunted, and landmark near which the deer was killed. Hunter should then sign the card and mail it to the Oregon State Game Commission, Portland, Oregon.

The commission urges hunters to return these cards within the next 30 days.

ITEM 1. TAXATION

My Honorable opponent has advertised through the mail that Klamath County has one of the highest tax rates in the State of Oregon. This is at variance with the facts as Klamath County enjoys one of the lowest millage rates among the Counties of Oregon.

This year's County millage rate is 20.4 mills which is 0.7 mills below last year. Higher millages in different units of the County are caused by special levies for fire districts, school improvements, cemetery districts, swimming pools, park districts, irrigation and drainage charges and various other assessments over which the County Court has no control.

ITEM 2. CITY-COUNTY JAIL FUND

My Honorable Opponent further states that if he were in office he would spend Public Funds only for the purpose for which they were intended.

The City-County Jail Fund was set up to build a City-County Jail in 1946 but in 1950 the city withdrew their share out of the Fund and built their own City Jail, leaving the City-County Jail Fund with no further purpose to accomplish. The County Court transferred part of this fund to build the County Library and located the Library building on County owned lots adjacent to other County buildings.

Item 3. PLANNING COMMISSION

My Honorable Opponent further states that he will have a County Planning Commission—which we have had for several years, since 1947 and at the present time they are Harry Obenchain, M. M. Stastny, Scott Warren, E. C. Lemler, and Jess N. Drew, all appointed by the County Court.

He would also have a County Purchasing Officer, which function is now ably performed by the Entire County Court.

Item 4. COUNTY ROADS

My Honorable Opponent further states that over a period of the last three (3) years the County has spent a large amount of money for County roads, equipment and materials.

Here are some of the results accomplished:
From 1908 to 1950 the County aided 132 miles of County roads and from January 1951 to date they have increased the oiled County roads 128.9 miles, making a total of 260.9 miles of oiled roads so that today 33% of the active County Road System is oil surfaced.

Practically as much was done in the last 4 years as was accomplished in the past 40 years. So I believe the money was well spent.

This progress was distributed as follows:

Malin Area	20.19 miles
Merrill Area	20.22 miles
Bonanza-Dairy-Longell Valley Area	26.48 miles

Sprague River Area	10.88 miles
Algoma Area	3.8 miles
Jan. 1951—Oct. 22, 1954	128.9 miles

These fine results has been accomplished by the County Court ably supported by other elected officials and all their employees.

That the County levy is gradually going down is a good indication that our present County Court is keeping a firm hand on the Public monies that pass through their hands.

Gentlemen: As the proof of the pudding is in the eating, so the proof of this statement is in the steady decrease of the County millage over the last three years.
