

### Arctic Air Hits Nation

A new blast of arctic air out of Canada Monday intensified in the Northern Plains the winter chill that lay over most of the United States east of the Rocky Mountains.

Gusty, northerly winds dropped temperatures in the Northern Midwest down to 18 degrees at Minot, N.D. Freezing weather was common early Monday except in New England and along the Pacific Coast—even as far south as Georgia, Alabama and Northern Texas. Birmingham had 32.

Snow flurries and occasional rain occurred over the middle and upper Mississippi Valley and over the Great Lakes, but amounts were small. Des Moines got .23 of an inch of precipitation as rain and snow mixed. Duluth had an accumulation of three inches of snow.

### Coal Gas Kills Three Sleepers

SHELANDOAH, Pa. (AP) — Three men suffocated yesterday in a gas-filled apartment. Police said the gas came from a clogged chimney badly damaged by Hurricane Hazel. Deputy Coroner Martin Murphy identified the three as Steve Kollonick, 67, and Jacob Shistle, 58, two bachelors, and John Kotes, 45, father of six children, who was visiting them. Murphy said there was a strong odor of coal gas in the apartment.

The question is what to do about juror No. 6. He is James R. Manning, a real estate agent, reported by the prosecution to have been convicted of a morals offense 11 years ago.

The perplexing juror situation arose Friday, forcing an abrupt halt to the proceedings. The prosecution then said a man with the same name as Manning had been convicted of a morals offense involving a 15-year-old boy. A suspended sentence was levied in the case.

Under courtroom rules, a criminal background automatically rules out a person for jury service. But once such a person is sworn in, the question is how to get him off the jury without declaring the case a mistrial.

Manning's wife Fernie, 37, was quoted by the New York Daily News as saying he will go to court today "with his chin up" and that he has no thought of pleading illness.

"When Jim came home on Friday and his old conviction was revealed we were as low as heart as any two people could be," she was quoted further as saying yesterday.

She declared her husband "still hurts badly," but visits from her pastor and friends helped a great deal.

William J. Corrigan, chief defense attorney, said the state would have to act first before he makes his move on the juror problem.

He declared, however, that he knew of no legal way to remove Manning from the jury panel.

Should that be the case, the only alternative for Judge Blythin would be to declare a mistrial. It was considered most unlikely that the state would agree to continue to trial with a person with a police record on the jury.

Judge Blythin himself said that until either side brings the matter before him in open court, the next order of business would be selection of two alternate jurors.

The judge gave no indication of how the problem might be solved, but said that should a mistrial be called, the case probably could not be called for trial again until sometime next year.

Dr. Sheppard is being tried on first-degree murder charges. He is accused of hacking to death his wife Marilyn, 31, in the bedroom of their lakefront home.

The 30-year-old osteopath denies the crime, saying it was committed by a bushy-haired intruder who twice knocked him unconscious.
