Idaho Posts Second Upset

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Burdette Hess booted a placekick squarely between the goal posts Saturday to give the Idaho Vandals their second upset victory in as many weeks, a 14-13 triumph over Utah in their nonconference football game here.

The Vandals, who surprised Washington State 10-0 the previous week, came from behind to post their second win for Coach Skip Stahley.

Utah scored in the first period after a sustained drive starting from the Redskins' 23 and full-back Lou Mele, who carried the ball most of the way, converted. Idaho evened the tally in the third period, with Mel Schmidt plunging over from the five after the Vandals had recovered a Utah fumble on the 30. Utah came right back scoring on Dave Dugan's 46 yard pass to Max Pierce, but the Idaho line blocked the placement.

In the fourth period, Idaho took the ball on its own 30 and moved it to the Utah 40. A sneaker play sent Wilbur Gary through the center of the Utah line all the way for a touchdown. Hess's perfect placement followed.

Former Colony Taken Over

PONDICHERY, India (AP) — Prime Minister Nehru's Indian government took over French India Monday, India's saffron, white and green flag replaced the French tricolor in this ancient capital. Artillery salutes boomed across the Bay of Bengal.

Along with Pondichery came the transfer of three other settlements ruled by the French for nearly 300 years. These are Karikal, Mahe and Yanam. A fifth French holding, the town of Chandernagore near Calcutta, was switched to rule of the Indian republic by treaty in 1952. In all, these totaled 196 square miles, with a population of 335,000.

The transfer became official with the signing of an agreement in Pondichery's century-old government house. Kewal Singh signed for India and Jerre Lande for France in the 10-minute ceremony.

Mother Refuses Baby Switch

STRATFORD, England (AP) — Two young mothers who refused to exchange their babies after doctors said they had been switched at the hospital have finally given in. They tearfully traded the 5-week-old boys yesterday — on a trial basis.

Doctors at the Forest Gate Hospital discovered last week they had made an error in identification the day after the infants were born. Subsequent blood tests proved there had been a mixup.

Mrs. Vera Bowers, 22, and Mrs. Sheila Read, 24, said they still are not convinced they had the wrong babies.

"We have been over every aspect of the problem," Mrs. Bowers' husband said, "and our wives have finally realized that if there is to be a switchover it has to be done as soon as possible."

Mr. Bowers added: "Before we come to a final decision, we want to see how the babies react."

Crowds Worry Big Four Clubs

Big Four clubs can start worrying about what to do for crowds in their two remaining Canadian pro football league games now that the playoff teams have been decided and it's simply a matter of filling out the schedule.

Everything was straightened out Saturday. The Montreal Alouettes and Hamilton Tiger-Cats made it positive they would meet in the two-game total-point finals starting Nov. 17 for the right to advance to the Nov. 27 Grey Cup final against the Western Conference

playoff winner. The Alouettes whisked the Toronto Argonauts out of the picture on the accurate pitching of quarter Sam Etcheverry. He tossed six touchdown passes as the Alouettes' Toronto 41-13.

And just to make sure the Argonauts would no longer be a playoff threat for 1954, the Hamilton Tiger-Cats whipped the Ottawa Rough Riders 30-9 to put themselves out of reach of the Toronto club.

In the Western Conference, the Saskatchewan Roughriders and Winnipeg Blue Bombers opened their two-game total-point semifinal series with a 14-14 tie. They meet Monday night at Regina with the winner moving into the best-of-three final against the league-winning Edmonton Eskimos at Edmonton Nov. 6.

Navy Collisions Occur In East

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — A destroyer rammed a submarine and two other destroyers banged into each other yesterday during anti-submarine warfare exercises in the predawn darkness off Norfolk. The Navy said nobody was hurt seriously but the four vessels limped toward port today with extensive damage.

The two collisions occurred in heavy seas less than an hour and a half apart some 270 miles out in the Atlantic. The destroyer Norris rammed the superstructure of the submarine Bergall at 3:32 a.m. At 5 a.m., the destroyers English and W. L. Lind collided while running down a submarine contact.

The ships were engaged in operation Landflex, largest postwar maneuvers of the Atlantic Fleet. More than 200 ships are taking part in the operation.

Dock Workers Tackle Cargo

LONDON (AP) — Dockers in eight British ports Monday tackled more than 500 million dollars worth of cargo piled up on the waterfront during their four-week strike.

The Communist-supported walk-out, by 44,000 demanding the right to refuse overtime work, had brought the vast port of London to a complete standstill and crippled operations at Liverpool, Birkenhead, Manchester, Southampton, Hull, Garston and Rochester.

Vital food imports were interrupted and shipments of manufactured exports were halted. The motor industry reckoned its loss in the export line at more than 15 million pounds (42 million dollars).

Union head Richard Barrett advised his men in London to "do all the overtime you can to get this port back into working condition."

As the day began, 340 ships—many loaded with perishable food—awaited unloading. At the London docks there were 29,000 tons of meat, 4,496 tons of butter, 525 tons of poultry and rabbits, 600 tons of cheese, 300 tons of eggs and 1,000 tons of bananas.

The stevedores agreed Friday to call off their stoppage and work a "reasonable" amount of overtime while their leaders negotiate on the issue with the employers.

Glancing Bullet Injures Hunter

SEASIDE (AP) — An elk hunter suffered minor chest wounds Sunday when a bullet fired by another hunter ricocheted off a tree and shattered.

He is Theodore Roels, 36, of Portland, who was hospitalized here.

It was not learned immediately who fired the shot.

GUERRILLAS

TUNIS, Tunisia (AP) — Terrorist murders and a guerrilla clash killed at least 14 persons in French North Africa over the weekend.

BOMBING

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP) — The Chinese Nationalist defense ministry said Communist planes Monday bombed the Nationalist-held Tachen Islands, about 200 miles north of here, for the first time. The ministry said one raiding plane was shot down.

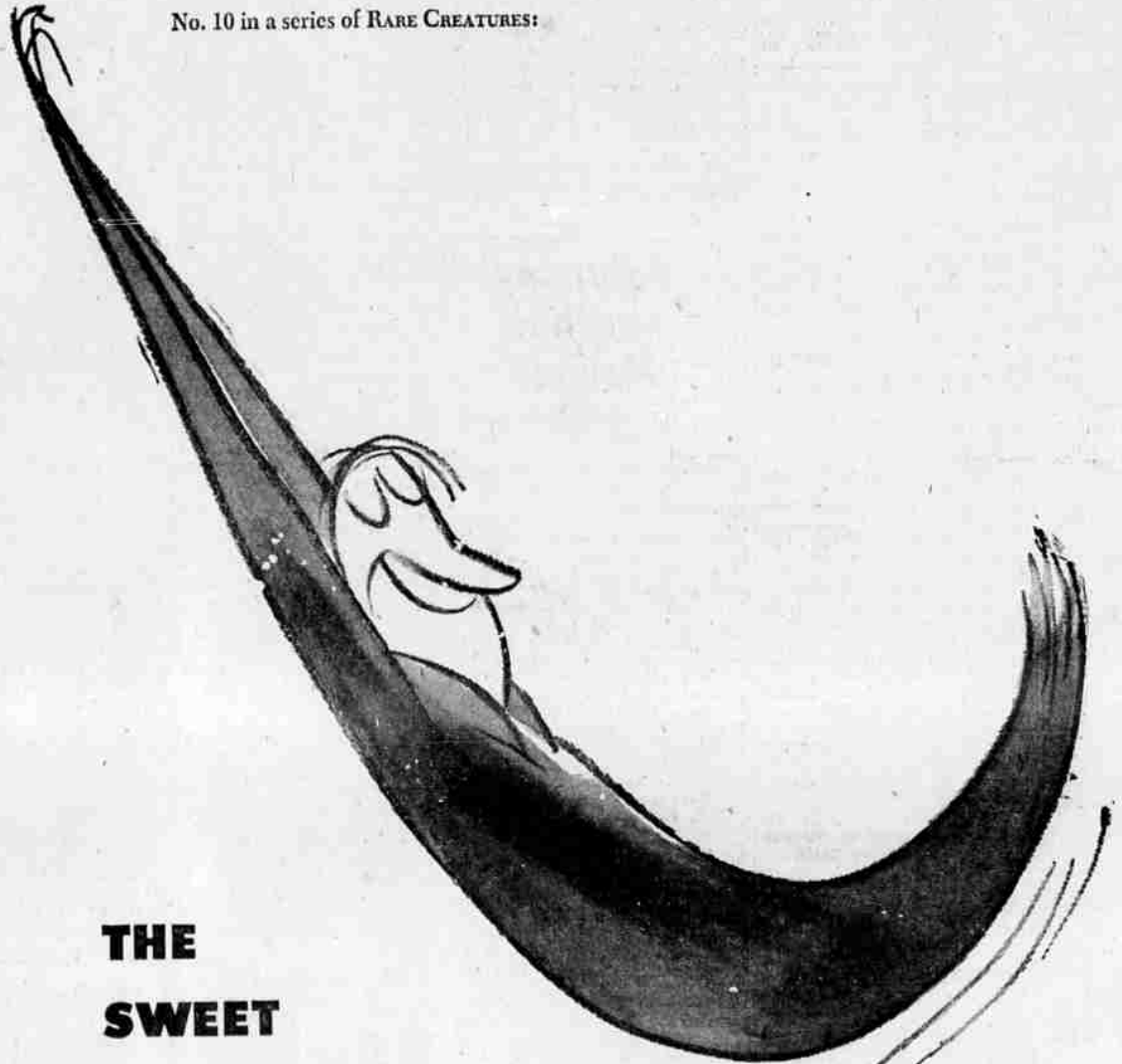
