Predatory Animals Killed

Seventeen predatory animals, including 15 coyotes and two bobcats, were taken in Klamath County in September, according to the State Department of Agriculture. In addition, two local hunters got five badgers, 11 porcupines and a skunk on their lines. The predatory hunting program is conducted jointly by the federal fish and wildlife service, the state Department of Agriculture and the county. The total predators taken in the state during September were 1,158 of which 625 were coyotes. The state total does not include badgers, skunks, raccoons and porcupines taken by the hunters.

Rough Weather Forecast Made

I believe tourist and recreation possibilities here can be more actively promoted.

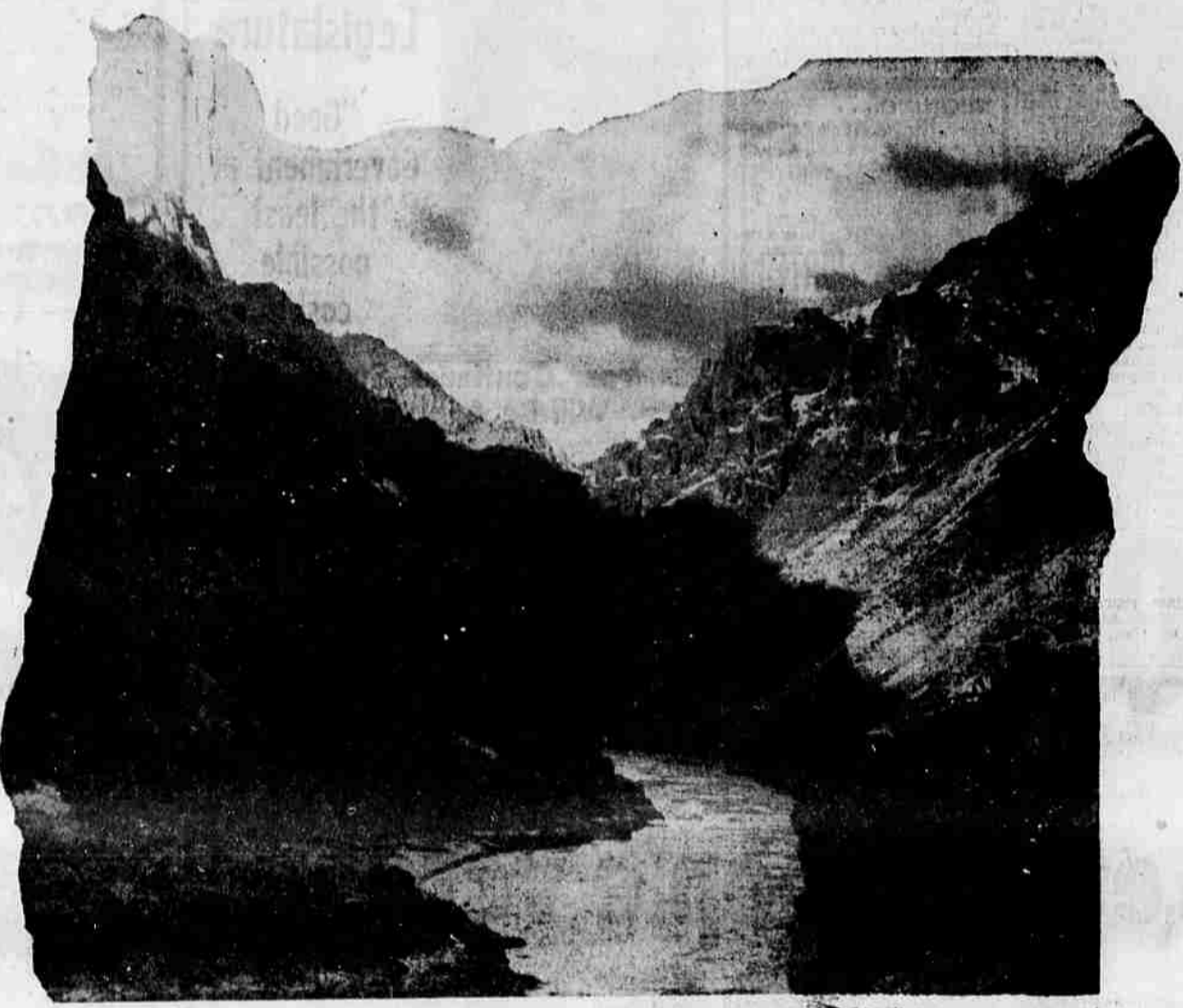
I represent no special interests or factions and would work for the best interests of Klamath County.
