A training course for volunteer instructors in Home Nursing and Civil Defense opened at Red Cross headquarters Monday morning. Mrs. Patricia Hunsaker, R.N., nursing representative for the Red Cross in Oregon, is conducting the course. Mrs. Hunsaker has had experience in public health nursing particularly in the supervisory field with the Multnomah County Public Health Department.

A five day course in instruction is offered to nurses and teachers within the community. Purpose of the instruction is to train volunteers who will teach groups within the community basic nursing skills for the home and in disaster work.

Sailors Return To Two Ships

PORTLAND (U) — AFL Sailors Union members returned to work Monday on two ships which were tied up over the weekend here because of a jurisdictional dispute. They had refused to man the vessels in retaliation for an action by the Independent Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union in San Pedro, Calif. William Benz, Sailors agent here, said the longshore union had failed to provide men to work on the so-called "sailors hatch" of a vessel here. It called it an attempt by the longshoremen to take away jobs from the Sailors Union.

However, Benz said "we don't like work stoppages any more than the employers" and a sailor reported for work Monday morning. The two vessels, the Santa Elita and the Hawaiian Logger, sailed shortly afterward.
