KF Council Backs New Road Plan

Irate residents of Riverside Addition, who stormed city council a week ago for street improvement in their area, left this week's city government session smiling approval.

In an election eve lull, Mayor Paul Landry told the dozen or more delegates from Riverside Addition that the county court has unofficially agreed to build a road up to the city limits, a distance of about 500 feet. If the court does, the city has a good chance of completing the road, a continuation of Lewis Street, clear up the hill, providing the school district cooperates.

The matter of school district participation is expected to be discussed at the next school board meeting November 8.

The mayor suggested that residents of the area, who have expressed a willingness to cooperate financially, indicate the amount they would be willing to contribute if additional funds are needed.

Present estimates on the job show the city's share of work will cost \$3,500. Landry suggested \$1,000 as an amount for residents of the area to raise.

At first dubious about the favorable report, delegates soon expressed pleasure at action to date. Said one: "We felt last week we might exceed from Klamath Falls, revert to Linkville and get to work with our own picks and shovels since the condition of our roads is more consistent with Linkville days."

New Freight Schedule Told

The Great Northern Railway Company has cut 19 hours from freight schedules between Los Angeles and the Pacific Northwest with a new fast freight train, it is announced by Ralph L. Merklin, G.N. general agent here.

The new train has reduced the former 75 hours running time between Los Angeles and Seattle to 56 hours, he added, and means that Klamath Falls receivers will be provided with second instead of third morning delivery on shipments out of the Southern California area. Existing freight schedules have also been speeded up.

The new train will, for the present, leave Los Angeles at 10 p.m. three times a week; on Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays, arriving at Klamath Falls the second morning, and at Portland and Seattle in time for third morning delivery. It will operate over a unified route via the Santa Fe, Western Pacific and Great Northern, and represents an all out effort by the carriers to provide the fastest possible schedules for Northwest receivers.
