

### Demos, GOP Retain Seats

SEATTLE (AP)—Washington's six Republicans and one Democratic congressman all retained their seats in the Tuesday election that brought defeat to the four initiative measures on the ballot.

### Utah Educator Wins Office

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—A veteran educator running for his first political office joined Rep. William A. Dawson today in keeping Utah's two congressional seats in Republican hands.

Dr. Henry Aldous Dixon, 64-year-old president of Utah State Agricultural College who entered the race only two weeks ago, defeated Democrat Walter K. Granger in the 1st District.

Dawson won in the 2nd District from red-haired Reva Beck Bosone, Democrat, who served two terms in Congress but lost to Dawson two years ago.

Dr. Dixon was a last-minute replacement for Rep. Douglas E. Stringfellow, who quit his race for reelection after admitting, tearfully, that the tales he had told of a hero's role in World War II were untrue.

Unofficial returns compiled by the Salt Lake Tribune gave these totals: 1st District, 236 districts of 523, Dr. Dixon 34,100, Granger, 2,642; 2nd District, 294 districts of 485 Dawson 51,117 Mrs. Bosone 28,052.

### Nationalists, Reds Battle

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP)—The Chinese Nationalists and Communists Wednesday exchanged fresh air blows in the third straight day of aerial warfare over the Tachen Islands area 200 miles north of Formosa.

Official reports here said Nationalist planes bombed the Red island of Toumen, 12 miles north of the Tachen group, returning pilots reported excellent results but further details were not available.

An hour later, Red planes dropped 10 bombs on the Nationalist-held Tachens in the third day of unprecedented Communist aerial strikes on Nationalist territory.

Monday's raid by nine twin-engine bombers was the first Red air attack against Nationalist offshore bases.

Tuesday night, Communist planes dropped eight bombs on upper Tachen Island but fled when Nationalist anti-aircraft guns opened fire, the Defense Ministry reported.

### Murray Retains Montana Post

HELENA, Mont. (AP)—Democrat James E. Murray apparently has won his fifth term in the United States Senate on the basis of almost complete returns from Tuesday's election.

The 78-year-old Democrat from Butte boosted his advantage over his Republican opponent, Rep. Wesley A. D'Ewart, to more than 2,000 with a spurt which netted Murray a gain of 484 votes in the last 16 precincts counted.

With 968 precincts of the state's 1,094 reported, Murray led, 105,367 to 103,210. The remaining precincts are small and widely scattered.

### Sports Official Named Sheriff

SEATTLE (AP)—Tim McCullough, well known sports official, was elected sheriff of King County in Tuesday's election. With the count incomplete he was 12,500 votes ahead of Harlan Callahan, longtime Republican incumbent.

Rep. Jack Westland, the Republican incumbent, at 10:30 a.m. The former national amateur golf champion from Everett was leading by about 4,700 votes at the time.

In the 1st District (Seattle-Bremerton), Rep. Thomas Felly also had a close race from Hugh Mitchell, the former Democratic senator and congressman.

Mitchell conceded defeat at 9 a.m., with Felly about 10,000 votes ahead.

Rep. Don Magnuson, congressman-at-large and the only Democrat in the state's House delegation, ran up a lead of more than 100,000 over former state Rep. Albert Canwell of Spokane. It was a far wider margin than the bare 10,000 by which Magnuson beat him in the same contest two years ago.

Magnuson had 404,798 to Canwell's 306,712, with 92 per cent of the state's precincts reported.

Virgil Anderson, Ph.D. director of speech and hearing, Stanford University; Lyman Barrett, speech and hearing, San Jose State College; Mary W. Huber, Ph.D., associate professor of speech, Los Angeles State College, and Joseph Smith, Ph.D. visiting professor of speech, University of Southern California were principal speakers at the annual conference.

Margaret Hall Powers, Ph.D. director, division of speech correction, Chicago public schools, was the speaker at the banquet held in the Bakersfield Inn Friday night, October 29.

Both Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Autenrieth are from the Siskiyou County office of the superintendent of schools.

### Spud Dealer Men Named

As the Klamath and Deschutes Russet potato advertising and promotion program swings into the 1954 campaign, two dealer service men will work with the wholesale and retail trade in Oregon and California.

Don Palmer of Redmond and Walter Mason of Oakland have been appointed as dealer service men for the Oregon Potato Commission, it was announced by Ben Davidson, administrator.

Palmer, who has been a fieldman doing work in research, equipment, containers and public relations throughout the potato-producing areas of the state for the commission for the last five years, will handle merchandising work. He will work with the wholesale and retail trade in the Willamette Valley, Portland and Southwest Washington during the current marketing season.

Mason, who has considerable retail and wholesale grocery experience and has been a salesman for Hunts Food in the Bay Area for the last five years, will do the merchandising work for Klamath-Deschutes potatoes in the San Francisco-Oakland Bay area and the Sacramento valley.

Palmer will work out of Portland during the Russet marketing season.

### Nevada Elects Former Actor

RENO (AP)—Rex Bell, former movie cowboy and husband of one-time U. S. girl Clara Bow, was elected Nevada's Lieutenant governor Tuesday.

Bell, a Republican, defeated Democrat James J. Ryan, president of the Nevada State Federation of Labor.

Returns from 330 of Nevada's 385 precincts gave Bell 24,000 to Ryan 16,000.

Ryan repeatedly asserted in his campaign "Bell's only qualification for office is his ability to grin on TV."

Bell operates a western goods store in Las Vegas.

### Wheat Program Meeting Called

MILTON-FREEWATER, 6—First report of a special meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation field crops committee's discussion of the present wheat program will be given here Nov. 8 at a dinner meeting of the Umatilla County Farm Bureau Federation.

The field crops group will meet at Fargo, N.D., Friday, Eber Howard, retiring county federation president, said Tuesday, and Floyd Root of Wasco will represent the Oregon federation at the meeting. Root will speak at the Nov. 8 meeting, as will Ben Robinson, Imbler, Oregon federation president, who will discuss the two-price or certificate wheat plan.

Howard said the Fargo meeting was called "due to dissatisfaction with the present program."

A Jury composed of six men and six women returned a verdict that gave Ward \$58,353 in a damage suit filed against Earl Phillip Zeal and the Keebler Concrete Company of Albany.

The Klamath man had sued Zeal and the Keebler Company for \$125,000 for severe back, chest, head and neck injuries, suffered on June 15, 1953 when the truck he was driving collided with a car operated by Zeal at the intersection of Fifth Avenue and Ellsworth Street in Albany.

Ward was thrown from the truck cab in the accident. His injuries, it was testified by physicians, will permanently disable him, thus depriving him of a position in which he was earning \$132 a week. Testimony proved that Zeal had failed to stop at a stop sign at the intersection.

The prosecution was handled by Albany attorney Robert McKechnie and Lamar Tooss Jr., Portland, while Zeal was represented by Sidney Twing, Springfield, and Keebler was represented by Weatherford and Thompson, Albany. Judge Fred McHenry of Corvallis presided.
