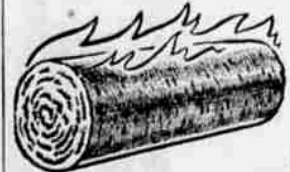

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Navy Office Hours Altered

New working hours are announced by the local Navy recruiting office.

Daily, Monday through Friday, the office at 307 Post Office Building, will be open from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday hours will be from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Navy is now accepting applicants for immediate enlistment as seaman recruit. The recruit training period has been reduced from 11 to nine weeks. Applicants processed through the local Navy recruiting office are sent to Portland for physical and mental examinations and after passing, are sworn in there and flown directly to the U.S. Naval Training Center, San Diego, to commence their recruit training.

A recent change of policy allows men who have been discharged from the Navy less than a year ago and who, at the time of separation, held one of the several critical ratings, are eligible to reenlist at their former rating. The ratings listed as critical are: communications technician, electrician's mate, electronics technician, pipefitter, interior communications electrician, mineman, radarman, radioman, sonarman and teleman.

Chief L. E. Cuffel, of the local recruiting office, also states that former Navy men reenlisting after only one previous Navy enlistment may elect to reenlist for two, three, four or six years. Full particulars may be obtained from the local recruiting office.
