Basin Potato Harvest Ends

With the exception of a small patch here and there the potato harvest in the Klamath Basin is in the bag.

After a poor growing season which brought frost each month during the summer, the weather took a turn for the better and with the exception of a couple of 8 degree nights in the south end of the valley the spud harvest was completed in record time.

The earlier forecast for a two thirds yield compared to 1953 is believed to be fairly reliable. Many growers report excellent yields but many fields produced only slightly over 100 sacks per acre. Most growers indicate that though the quality of the crop is good, potatoes will be small due

to the many setbacks by frost last spring.

The main potato harvest was about 10 days late getting underway but there is very little evidence of field frost, potato experts report.

Movement of potatoes to market has been extremely slow. With plenty of storage space it is evident that growers are holding onto the crop anticipating a better price later on.

Up to November 1, shipments lagged behind the same period for a year ago by 943 cars. Last year

1529 cars were moved by this date as compared to 577 cars this year.

Growers, nationally, received lower average prices for their potatoes during the month ending October 15. But prices are averaging higher than a year ago. Potatoes stood at 63 per cent of parity on October 15 compared with 51 per cent a year earlier.

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US Farm Export Prospects Told

The prospect for U.S. farm ex-ports this year looks fairly hope-ful. Foreign service specialists of the U.S. Department of Agriculture caution that healthier foreign mar-kets are no cure-all for the sur-plus problem.

Experts, however, do expect an

increase in agricultural exports of 10 per cent or more, compared with the past year. They are most hopeful for bigger sales abroad of cotton and tobacco. They also ex-pect some gains in export of wheat, grain sorghums, barley and rice. They say we will continue to ex-

port fats, oil and oil seeds in heavy volume. They see some in-crease for fruit, too.

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
