Unbeaten VPI Places Bid For Bowl Contest

The unbeaten but once-lid Gobbler of Virginia Polytechnic Institute put in a bid for a bowl game today hours before the nation's top-ranking college football teams swung into action in contests that could go a long way toward deciding the lineups for the Jan. 1 games.

VPI, defeated George Washington 20-13 in one of last night's top games for its seventh victory. The only blot on the Gobbler's record is a 7-7 tie with William and Mary. Only unimpressive Waynesburg and traditional rival, VMI, remain to bar VPI's first undefeated season in the school's modern history. The underdog Boston College

Pirates Edge By Prep Foe

Marshallfield, No. 1 in the Associated Press high school football poll, and South Salem, ranked second, posted victories Friday night to win district championships and complete the lineup for the state class 1A playoffs.

Marshallfield, one of the few remaining undefeated and untied teams in the state, clinched the district 5 title by edging North Bend 14-13. Underdog North Bend piled up big advantages in yardage—320 to 153—and in first downs—15 to 4—but two successful conversions by Sandy Fraser saved Marshallfield from being upset.

South Salem won the district 3 berth as expected with an easy 31-7 victory over North Salem.

St. Helens, Central of Monmouth-Independence and Vale, won berths in the A-2 tournament by taking district championships Friday.

St. Helens downed Oswego 14-6 for the district 1 title; Central beat Serra of Salem 40-7 for the district 3 championship; and Vale defeated Ontario 26-20 in district 8.

Saturday games could complete the lineup for the A-2 tournament as Junction City plays Pleasant Hill in district 5 and Ashland meets Coquille in a district 6 clash.

The other six 1-A district berths for the state playoffs had been filled previously.

The tournament gets underway next week and when Jefferson of Portland goes to Salem, Milwaukie plays at Beaverton, Marshallfield travels to Medford and Pendleton visits Portland to meet Lincoln.

In Friday games, Milwaukie, No. 7 in the AP poll, defeated West Linn 19-13; Beaverton, No. 9, edged Gresham 3-0; Medford, No. 5, overpowered Central Point 41-9; and Pendleton, No. 6, whipped Milwaukie 31-6.

Grants Pass, No. 3, was upset 12-9 by unranked Roseburg; Jefferson, No. 4, and Lincoln, No. 10, were idle.

Prineville, No. 8, the only A-2 team in the top ten was held to a 6-6 tie with Bend Friday. Prineville already has won a spot in the A-2 tourney. Other district champions are Reedsport and Dallas. Dallas suffered its first defeat of the season Friday night, losing 13-9 to Sandy.

Peoria Cats Win World Hoop Tourney

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — Basketball has played in the country of its origin is still the best as proved by the Peoria (Ill.) Caterpillars in winning the second world tournament Friday night.

The Caterpillars completed an all-victorious march through the tournament by defeating previously unbeaten Brazil 62-41 in the deciding game before a capacity crowd of 15,408.

The Cats won two games in the preliminary round and then brushed aside the Philippines, France, Uruguay, Canada, Nationalist China and Israel, in addition to Brazil in the round-robin final round.

Brazil finished second, beaten only by the United States. The Philippines wound up third after bowing to the two leaders in the final round. France was fourth with a 3-4 record. Uruguay, Canada and China each won two of seven games and Israel brought up the rear with 1-6.

The South Americans never were in Friday night's game after the first few minutes. The Cats broke away from a 12-11 margin to lead 36-19 at the half and continued to pull away in the second half. The U. S. scoring was divided among seven players with Ed Solomon dropping in 14 points to take offensive honors.

McCashin edged out Hans Winkler, the world champion from Germany, who was clocked in 31.8 seconds. Col. Charles Baker, of Canada, was third in 31.9 seconds.

Mexico's team of Gen. Humberto Mariles and Capt. Joaquin d'Harcourt, won the three-day international low score event in a jump-off with the German pair of Fritz Thiedemann and Mrs. Helga Kohler. The two teams finished the competition in a tie at 16 faults each.

"It pays to train hard," said the Pittsburgh Negro as he sat on his dressing room table accepting congratulatory on his 36th victory in 42 fights.

"I worked hard for this fight. I did two miles of road work every day for two months. I was really in shape and it showed in my performance."

Even the opposing camp, Jimmy Slade and his manager Al Joyner, had to agree with Baker. Down the hall in Slade's dressing quarters, Joyner said he thought Baker was in the best shape of his career.

"They isolated the big guy for two months. He did nothing but work. He hasn't been in such good shape in four years," said Joyner of Pittsburgh Bob. "He's a good fighter."

DISGUSTED

As for Slade, the New York State champion was disgusted with his work. He said the seven month layoff hurt him. Slade hadn't fought since last April 29 when he fractured his left hand beating Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson.

Slade simply was overpowered. At 179½, Slade gave away 31½ pounds to Baker. The aggressive New York Negro had to punch at long range and get on his bicycle to keep out of range of the powerful Baker counters.

As for Slade, he was a moving, bobbing, weaving target. Baker kept plodding around the ring, shooting strong right and left hand counters that shook Slade to his toes.

The decision was unanimous with Judge Paul Stille carding it 6-2-2; Judge Bill Yancey 7-3-1; Referee Zach Clayton 6-3-1. The Associated Press scored it 7-2-1.

The Husky frosh took the opening kickoff and went 74 yards to score in the first few minutes of the game. The Rooks got on the scoreboard late in the same period when a fumbled Washington pitchout rolled across the end zone for a safety and two points for OSC.

The Rooks went ahead in the third quarter, 8-7, when Sam Wesley nailed Bob DeGrant on a pass play that covered 79 yards to the Washington end zone, only to have the Husky frosh sew up the game with a fourth quarter rally.

Ball Fans Berate Al Lopez

NEW YORK (AP) — Cleveland fans who have memories as long as Indians, still are berating Manager Al Lopez via the public prints for not having given that grand campaigner, Bob Feller, a chance to pitch in the World Series.

The more they think about those four straight routings by the Giants, the more firmly convinced they become that the disaster would have been averted if the leading winner of ball games still practicing his profession had been given a crack at the National League.

Al can look forward hearing more about the matter next season.

Feller, incidentally, should have at least an even chance of climbing into seventh place among the all-time winning pitchers next year. Only nine more victories added to his present total of 263 would do the trick for the veteran from Van Meter, Iowa.

Cy Young, still hale at 87, leads the pack with an almost unbelievable 511 wins, followed by Walter Johnson with 416. Christy Mathewson and Grover Cleveland Alexander each 373. Eddie Plank 263 and Lefty Moses Grove an even 300. Feller's nine victories would vault him over Burleigh Grimes, 270, Eppa Rixey, 266, and Red Ruffing, with whom he is tied at 262, into the seventh spot behind Grove.
