Health Talks To Be Given

Dr. Leon De Seblo, author, lecturer and world traveler, will begin a series of lectures on hygiene and nutrition Sunday evening at 8 o'clock in the Crater Room of the Winema Hotel. Lectures will continue at that time each evening through Tuesday.

The speaker offers what he terms a "supreme law for prolongation of life and the universal principle of rejuvenation."

He received his medical education at Tallin, Estonia, and as a physician authored Health Through Natural Methods in 1923. The following year he wrote Youth at 70; Health for 100. His last published work is Sickness and Senility are Unnecessary.

In 1932 De Seblo graduated from Inter-Collegiate University at London as a Doctor of Divinity. He was ordained that same year as a Syrian Antioch Catholic priest not to be confused with Roman Catholic.

He now conducts a hygienic school in the Lake Tahoe region; pastors a church in Los Angeles and maintains a home in Palo Alto for his wife and three children, aged 9, 12 and 6 1/2. The doctor himself, a retired physician since 1932, is 71 years old.

Dr. De Seblo made a world lecture tour in 1930. A few years ago, he lectured in Klamath Falls. Now on a second world tour, he has been greeted by thousands who, including doctors, have been amazed at the results of his teachings.

The public is invited to his second local lecture series.

Longtime KF Resident Dies

The death of Fred C. Bamber, resident of Klamath Falls for about 40 years, was learned here here. He died November 5 at the home of a daughter in McCool, California.

Mr. Bamber was born, May 10, 1872 at Galena, Kansas. He came to Klamath Falls in 1903 and was a painting contractor. He has lived for the past year with a daughter in Medford.

He is survived by his widow Stella; three daughters, Mrs. Joe Daly, Medford, Mrs. L. E. McGonagle, McCool, California and Mrs. Bob Tibbles, San Bernardino, California; two grandchildren including Ray N. (Jack) Propst, Cloverdale, California, and four great grandchildren; also a nephew George Goddard, former employe of the Herald and News now with the Coos Bay Times.

Funeral services are being held Monday, November 8 followed by cremation.

Judge Seeks To Outlaw Comics

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Superior Judge William B. McKesson has asked the Board of Supervisors for a county ordinance outlawing the sale of crime, sex and horror-type "comic" books.

"The increase in violence of juvenile acts of delinquency seems to indicate that the minds of children continuously exposed to the comic book diet are affected by the details of horror crimes so prevalent in certain types of such books," said a resolution signed by Judge McKesson.
