Formosa Said Rich Prize

TAIPEH, Formosa, (AP)—Peiping's demand that Formosa be "returned" to Red China is usually ascribed to political motives. But a visit to this island after 18 months away makes a reporter wonder whether the Communists don't also have their eyes on its economic wealth. Formosa has become a pretty rich prize to a nation which is tightening its belt. Four years ago, the island was a rundown operation. Its railroads were junk. Its roads were dilapidated. Its factories, mostly idle, still were unpaired from the war. Its electrical grid was a mess. Its trade balance was adverse, and getting worse. Then Uncle Sam began to pour aid in here. Today the railroads are new. Roads are a good network and either new or refurbished. Factories are running and harnessed to the production of consumer goods that lessen imports. For example, the aluminum plant at Koahsiung, instead of shipping ingots to Japan as before, now turns them over to local fabricators. Key industries are "lovely" build-

SP Conference Held In KF

Approximately a dozen persons, employees of the Southern Pacific, are attending a three-day conference starting here Monday on Southern Pacific's new "campus-on-rails." This specially-equipped railroad car has been designed by Southern Pacific to carry training programs to its key men throughout the system, according to J. A. McKinnon, Shasta Division superintendent. Meetings here are being conducted by J. C. Slade, assistant division superintendent, with H. W. Myers, supervisor of employment for the railroad, assisted by Ray Nelson and Ben Tipton. The car, parked near the Southern Pacific station, is here on part of a six-month series of visits to important division points. McKinnon said. The program is a company extension of a mid-summer management conference on employment methods conducted at the California Institute of Technology at Pasadena. The new "campus-on-rails" is a former S.P. passenger lounge. It is equipped with a 25-foot conference table with seating for 20, conference leader's table, screen and projector, etc. Attending the seminar from here will be H. A. Teal, J. L. Harrison, A. L.
