Type Machine Given College

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis — An old-time, type-setting machine, a Unitype, used by Oregon newspapers in the early part of this century, has been given to the Oregon State College journalism department by the Amity Standard.

It is reported to be the only remaining machine of its kind in Oregon.

The Unitype mechanically set type characters in a line through use of a keyboard. It was made obsolete by improvements in the Linotype and other slug-casting machines.

The machine was given to the college by Phil Meeker, who recently purchased the Amity Standard, and Mrs. Gertrude Richter, widow of the late Henry J. Richter, who was editor from 1917 to 1949.

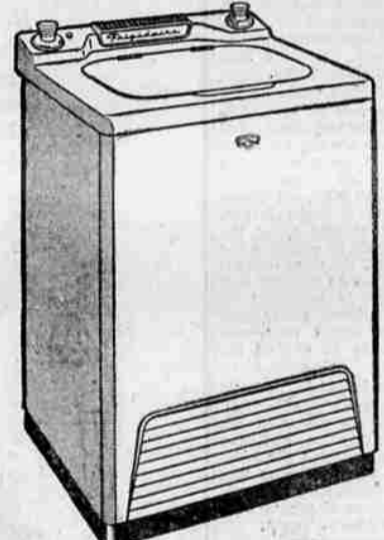
