

Dairymen Eye Law Changes

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis—Oregon dairymen have been asking: "Where do we go from here?" since the Milk Control Law was repealed last Tuesday. Many of them are eyeing Seattle's Federal Marketing Order as a possible solution.

A federal milk marketing order sets minimum farm prices for market milk. It does not set retail prices. The stated objective is to assure farmers of steady, dependable markets and prices for their

milk, and assure consumers of an adequate supply. Details of operation vary from one marketing area to the next, depending on the wishes and needs of the dairymen.

The fluid milk, Class I, price takes into account such items as the prices of butter, cheese, dried skim milk, condensed milk, or general economic factors and production costs, according to the pricing formula selected. The final price also depends on the proportion of milk in each class of use.

Procedure for obtaining a federal order is similar to that used for the marketing agreements now in effect on filberts and walnuts. Any interested party can file a petition with the Secretary of Agriculture asking that an order be established. A hearing is called, and every producer and handler in the area is notified and asked to present any facts they wish to offer. The proposed marketing area may include all or parts of several states, depending on the nature of the market supply.

It looked like another pleasant autumn day Tuesday for most of the nation with clear skies and above seasonal temperatures.

There were a few wet spots. Heavy rains soaked the coasts of Northern California and Southern Oregon Monday. There was light rain in Eastern Texas and in Northern New England. Heaviest falls along the Pacific Coast measured nearly three inches at Fort Bragg, Calif., and nearly two inches at Brookings, Ore.

It was fairly warm Monday over most of the Florida Peninsula, in the Southern Mississippi Valley and from Texas northward to Southern Iowa. Temperatures up to 70 were reported as far north as Omaha. It was 73 at Lamoni, Iowa.

Early morning reports Tuesday included: New York 48 and clear; Chicago 46 and clear; San Francisco 59 and rain; Los Angeles 57 and partly cloudy; Denver 36 and clear; New Orleans 52 and partly cloudy; Miami 64 and clear; Caribou, Maine, 35 and partly cloudy; Detroit 36 and partly cloudy; Minneapolis 49 and partly cloudy.
