WALL STREET

NEW YORK (U) — The stock market ran into periodic profit-taking Tuesday following its great post-election boom, but it managed to absorb the offerings and remain higher.

Gains had a practical ceiling of between 1 and 2 points, with some going higher, and losses seldom went beyond a point.

Volume in the first hour was extremely heavy, but the pace slackened somewhat after that. It came to an estimated 2,300,000 shares as compared with 3,180,000 shares traded Monday.

North Korea Information Enters Case

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (U) — The government said Tuesday that information relating to 1951 operations in North Korea figures in the secret material which one-time government code expert Joseph E. Petersen Jr. is charged with misusing.

Petersen, 40, of Arlington, Va., dismissed research analyst for the National Security Agency, was indicted by a federal grand jury here on Oct. 20 on charges that he obtained defense secrets with "intent or reason to believe" that they would be used to the injury of this country and to aid another.

NSA is a hush-hush organization dealing largely with monitoring of communications.

Both the U. S. and Netherlands governments have stated that Petersen supplied certain information to a Dutch embassy official in Washington. The Dutch said there was an exchange of information, and that they believed it had been authorized in continuation of a World War II arrangement.

Petersen, now free on \$10,000 bond, pleaded innocent to the charges.

His attorneys, meanwhile, demanded a bill of particulars from the government which was supplied Tuesday.

The bill of particulars, filed in Federal Court here and signed by John F. Reilly, special assistant to Atty. Gen. Brownell, turned out to be a cryptic 350-word document. The government obviously attempted to answer the court order by disclosing a minimum of secret material.

Among other things, the bill said that some time during March or April 1948 Petersen "copied and made notes from classified documents, indicating United States success in breaking codes utilized by the Netherlands government."

Lake Lawyer May Defend J. Anderson

Herbert P. Welch, pioneer Lakeview attorney, announced Tuesday that he has been retained tentatively to defend James Quinton Anderson, 37-year-old Beatty rancher, charged with first degree murder and assault with intent to commit murder in Klamath County.

The defense lawyer is the father of District Attorney Robert Welch of Lake County.

The two charges against the alleged slayer of Richard David Miller, 25-year-old son of a wealthy former Tucson, Arizona family are being investigated by the grand jury. Miller was instantly killed by a shot blast either last Friday night or early Saturday morning.

Authorities are holding two material witnesses who say they saw Anderson fire the fatal shot.

The accused killer is also charged with a "night of terror" assault upon Mr. and Mrs. Albert Sidney Menasco Jr. of Grants Pass, who were trapped in a woods near Beatty and kept under constant gunfire during an entire night.

Welch told the Herald and News on the long distance telephone from Lakeview that all he knew about the charges against Anderson was what he had read in the newspapers. It was reported at Klamath County Courthouse that Welch plans to ask for a change of venue on grounds that his client could not obtain a fair trial in Klamath County.

Besides the Beatty homicide and the alleged attack upon the Menascos, Anderson is also a key figure in a pending assault with a deadly weapon case against Alfonso Torres, Mexican lumberjack, who is in the county jail awaiting trial. Anderson, according to Sheriff Murray Britton, slashed Torres' throat with a knife after the Mexican went berserk and shot up the barroom at the Halfway House in Bly last July.

Leon Jenkins, Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. employee, was critically wounded by a revolver shot during the affray.

The arrest of Anderson for the alleged murder of Miller ended a dramatic 18-hour manhunt by state police and sheriff's officers. Anderson was arrested by State Policeman Larry Bergmann in a Beatty home in which he had engaged in a fist fight with the homicide victim a few hours earlier.

INTERVIEW

Some high ground and the Reclamation canal assure perfect drainage for the acreage which is large enough to provide for a school building of modern design, playgrounds, athletic fields, boundary grounds, landscaping and adequate parking.

Parking at the new site must be included in the overall ground since no adjacent street space is available. Between three and five acres of public parking can be used at KUHS.
