Cy Palmer, manager of United Airlines, suggested that, as has been the experience in other cities, the drive might be falling down among the higher paid people in the community, "those who don't feel they will be exposed to the needs served by the agencies sup-

ported through the drive." "The lower paid workers are giving more, in proportion to their pay, than executives, managers and other high salaried people," Palmer opined.
