KF Freight Rate Change Approved

Word of ICC approval of elimination of arbitraries first sought by Acme Fast Freight, Inc., was received Tuesday by N. J. Mundlin, local Acme general agent, in a teletype from Thomas A. Bradley, president of Acme Fast Freight, whose headquarters are in New York.

The teletype message stated that Bradley's action in removing "the irritating freight rate arbitraries from the Pacific Coast tariffs on November 10, affecting nearly 500 communities in Oregon, Washington and California, won the approval of the ICC."

Because of Klamath Falls' location as a natural distribution hub for the Midland Empire, it will enjoy the same freight rates as Portland and Seattle on shipments originating in eastern and mid-western cities.

Bradley stated in making the announcement: "Broad equalization affecting such a large number of communities whose natural development has been hindered by the present forwarder and truck rate structures should add materially in the further development of these Pacific Coast terminal points and prove a tremendous boon to business throughout the coast are affected."

Coincidentally with the announcement of the elimination of arbitraries, Acme Fast Freight, Inc., put into effect freight rate reductions on all classes of freight shipments in Acme service. This tariff change will mean substantial savings in freight costs on the later holiday merchandise shipments arriving locally, as well as all shipping hereafter.

Klamath Club Hears Hunters

Peter and Marcia Ryhner, intrepid hunters of big game, provided an entertaining evening Tuesday for the Klamath Falls Knife and Fork Club at a dinner in the Willard Hotel.

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Klamath School Building Improvement Plan Reviewed

School building improvements in Klamath Union High School and two city elementary buildings, Pelican and Fairview, are nearing completion. Funds were made available through voter approval last May of five year aerial levies at a special election.

Remodeling of the present high school building is the first phase in an over-all plan to modernize and expand to meet the educational needs of 2000 students. It will include the building of a new wing on the site of the old county library building, now being vacated. Classrooms will immediately be established in this building, to be used until actual construction of the wing gets under way.

Current changes in the original structure allow for a four-way choice of traffic to classrooms in corridors where 110 new metal lockers have been installed, the establishment of a library on the third floor, new commercial classrooms, conference rooms and student testing rooms.

The library, centrally located in the building, is easily accessible from all academic units. Bookcases line the walls and provide a temporary division wall for a study room which can be thrown into the main room when needed. Latest type reading tables are being installed. A U-shaped check desk has work space for several assistants to the librarian.

Outside sound has been cut to

a minimum by sound-proofing materials. Side rooms have been provided for librarians, book repairs and supplies. Art work and drapes will be added by the high school art department.

An average of 200 of the 5000 volumes on the shelves are checked out daily to students. Students act as assistant librarians.

Two new commercial rooms provide seating space for 80 students. Each room is equipped with one row of adjustable metal typing desks to accommodate the 15 per cent of students who need varying heights for machines.

The ceiling in the former two-story gymnasium has been lowered to allow for the added rooms above. Overhead heating pipes in the basement cafeteria have been moved between the ceiling and next floor and provision has been made to convert the present cafeteria into classrooms when the proposed new wing is added.

Cost of the high school construction has been slightly above \$80,000.

At Pelican school, where 250 children are now registered, a long-range plan is being carried out by present construction to accommodate a possible future total of 500 students. Remodeling of the two-story building completed in 1921, with an addition 10 years later, provides for a new boiler plant, sanitation system, conversion of the present gymnasium into an auditorium, a cafeteria on the first floor, two classrooms, re-routed corridors, dressing rooms and lavatories.

The ground area above the buried septic tank in the rear of the building will be used for a parking area. Land for the disposal system was purchased from the Car-Ad-Co.

A stage will be added next summer in the auditorium to complete the work.

Overall cost at Pelican is \$125,000.

At Fairview work is progressing toward the end of a remodeling and expansion program. Here, also, the auditorium was converted from the gymnasium and a stage added. Curtains from the KUHS stage were reclaimed and

Death Claims Ore. Lawyer

Word of the death of James Horace Lane, 67, in a Corvallis hospital October 26, has been received here.

A lifetime resident of Oregon he was well known by old-timers in the Klamath Basin.

Despite the fact that he was blind Lane attended school at Salem and later was graduated from the Oregon Law School at Salem and the University of Tennessee Law School. Upon graduation he was to young to take the Oregon bar examination, but he was later admitted to the Oregon Bar Association in 1908.

After several years as an attorney Lane moved to Corvallis in 1925 where he established the Corvallis Credit Bureau. He has been retired since 1943.

Graveside services were held at Silver Lake Saturday, October 30.
