According to him, there were over 80 hunter started fires in the state of Oregon this year during the hunting season, and they destroyed a total of over 1000 acres.

This made a total of about one third of the man-caused fires during the season and accounted for more than two thirds of the total acreage burned.

VET'S MAILBAG

Veterans training under the Korean GI Bill are aiming for high skill jobs and away from "snap" courses, a Veterans Administration study revealed today.

The study—the first made of Korean GI training objectives—analyzed courses chosen by the half-million post-Korean veterans who had enrolled in training during the first two years of the Korean GI Bill. Half had entered college; the rest had enrolled in schools below college, on-the-job and on-the-farm.

The largest single group of veterans—one out of every five, or a total of 144,000—enrolled for highly skilled craft and trade occupations. Included are 37,000 who studied mechanics, with automotive mechanics leading two to one; 26,000 who chose radio and television; 21,000 in metalworking; and 18,000 in the construction trades. Smaller numbers selected other trades such as printing and electrical work.

Ten per cent of the trainees, 51,000 chose business management and business administration, and 14,000 prepared to be accountants or auditors.

Another 10 per cent, of 50,000, entered training in the field of science. The majority, 30,000 studied engineering, while 13,000 chose medicine and related courses.

Among other veterans studying for the professions or the arts, 16,000 were enrolled in teaching courses; 9,000 in law; 6,400 in psy-

chology, economics and other social sciences; 2,500 for the ministry; 12,000 in art and design; 1,200 in architecture; 2,500 in music; and 1,000 in journalism.

On-the-farm trainees under the Korean GI Bill numbered 24,000. A number of veterans were using the Korean GI Bill to acquire a general education. Among them 105,000 were in colleges and universities—21,000 taking liberal arts courses. Also, 33,000 were students in the nation's high schools and grade schools.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Q. I understand that a veteran may not receive Korean GI training benefit payments if they duplicate payments made by the Government under some other program. I plan to enroll in a land-grant college, which gets Federal funds from a non-VA source. Would I still be permitted to take my training under the Korean GI Bill?

A. Yes. The fact that the Government provides funds to land-grant colleges would not deprive you of your rights to enroll under the Korean GI Bill. The ban on duplicate payments would apply only if you yourself were to get money from two Federal sources—the VA and some other agency.

TELLING THE EDITOR

TOO MUCH

Will you please print the following in your "Telling the Editor" column?

Attention Mrs. Roy Thomas Bonanza, Oregon—

Since Mrs. Thomas has very helpfully and methodically enumerated certain "obvious facts" concerning local legal problems, I am certain that she would not hesitate to be of still more educative assistance by enlightening The Editor on the following points—

1. Who is the judge (name please) who has "prostituted the powers of his office to gain advantage in a personal feud"? Who is this man who inspires questions about the size of his mind and the degree to which his motives have been corrupted?

2. What are Mrs. Thomas' legal qualifications for judging the correctness of a decision in a court of law? What facts does she have to base her judgement on other than the newspaper accounts (which she has discounted)? Does she know the difference between a moral and a legal question? Can she tell us who warned against "bearing false witness" and cautioned that we should "judge not, that ye be not judged"?

3. Does Mrs. Thomas know any bribe-taking officials in this county? If so, who are they and from whom did they take bribes and for what?

4. Is Mrs. Thomas an exponent of the McCarthy technique of character assassination and defamation by means of innuendo, implication, etc.?

5. Will Mrs. Thomas enumerate her step-by-step mental processes which have enabled her to arrive at the "obvious fact" that the judge to whom she refers is proven merely because Mr. Alderson is anti-vice and the two have differed on legal questions? Has Mrs. Thomas taken the trouble to interview either of these parties in order that she might get a first-hand account of the matter?

6. Does Mrs. Thomas imply that most county officials do not favor honor and integrity in the administration of public office? Does she doubt that most law enforcement officers in this county (city, county, and state) who perhaps do not have the opportunity to "speak out publicly" but who, day by day, faithfully perform their duties for decency and honest law enforcement? If the answers are in the affirmative, what are her factual reasons?

7. Will Mrs. Thomas kindly give us the date on which the local paper defended the items which she so carefully enumerated?

Mrs. Thomas' letter is the last

of several which have been printed in the letter column and which have been in the same vein. It is obvious that it is based on nothing more than an urge to publicity state that she favors law and order and integrity in public office. I am certain that she will discover that the majority of the people of this county, private citizens and public officials alike, are just as intent upon maintaining those very desirable conditions as she is and that, in their private lives or otherwise, they very quietly and unostentatiously strive to do what they can.

It is not only Mrs. Thomas, of course, who has found it convenient to make sweeping statements concerning matters about which she is uninformed. I wonder how many of those who are quick to criticize stop to contemplate the many safeguards which have been erected to insure that the American way of life may continue? Those safeguards are for your protection and mine. The basis of our criminal law is that one is presumed innocent until he is proved guilty. Who would want it any other way? If you believe that this is not a proper basis for our criminal laws take the time to read Erle Stanley Gardner's "The Court of Last Resort" and then reconsider your opinion.

Do you know whose responsibility it is to decide whether the constitutional and statutory rights of an individual are being violated? It is that of the trial judge in the first instance and appellate courts thereafter. Do you know that a district attorney is required by the constitution of this state to observe certain rights of the accused and that he takes an oath that he will do so?

I would suggest, Mrs. Thomas, that you ask Mr. Alderson himself whether he honestly believes that your insinuations and statements concerning "a judge" have any validity. I am certain that if he is everything which you believe him to be he will tell you that the problem is, and always has been, a legal one. If you care to pursue the matter further you may find in the official court records where Mr. Alderson has admitted procedural errors made in his office. I might suggest in closing that you also examine the records as to the number of reversals of "a

WASHINGTON (AP)—The speech which Sen. McCarthy prepared for the Senate today—in his own defense against censure—goes far beyond anything he has ever said or claimed before.

This speech, which he released late yesterday, is a basic restatement of his attitude and tactics toward criticism of himself over the past four years. History may remember it as an extraordinary document.

The speech goes so far in its implications it is difficult to believe McCarthy can surpass it; he holds himself and those who go along with him as the country's chief defenders against communism and links the fate of the nation to his own fate.

Without using the word "martyr," he clearly suggests he is a man persecuted.

Senate debate begins today on recommendations of a special committee created to consider charges of misconduct against McCarthy. This committee of three Democrats and three Republicans was headed by Sen. Watkins (R-Utah).

It investigated, held hearings, let McCarthy reply to the charges, and recommended that the full Senate censure him on two counts. (A) that he ignored requests to testify made upon him by a previous committee which investigated the charges of the law and a devotion to the legal system which he represents.

Former Iran Minister Shot

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Former Foreign Minister Hossein Fatemi, lieutenant of Mohammed Mossaddegh's government, died before an army firing squad at dawn today for his part in the 1953 plot to oust the Shah.

Fatemi was convicted and sentenced by a military court a month ago. An appeal to Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi failed.

The secret execution at Ghaas Barracks came as a surprise. Army sources said last weekend it would be delayed indefinitely because Fatemi was seriously ill.

Tehran's military governor, Gen. Teimour Bakhtiar, said Fatemi walked without trembling to the stake, where he was blindfolded and bound. He said "May God protect you" just before four volleys from the four-man firing squad crumpled him.

Fatemi's former chief, ex-premier Mossaddegh, was convicted last December of trying to overthrow the monarch. He is serving three years solitary imprisonment. Gen. Fazollah Zahedi, the present premier, overthrew Mossaddegh Aug. 19, 1953, after the Shah had fled the country, but in the confusion Fatemi escaped.

He was captured last March 15. Stabbed by a bystander as he was arrested, he was reported near death in a military hospital for several weeks. He heard his trial sentence from a stretcher.

United States Senate." He declared the Watkins committee was playing the Communists' game in voting against him.

He didn't say the committee had knowingly played the Communist game, but that it was a "victim" of the Communist campaign.

"And," said McCarthy, "having been victimized, it became the Communist party's involuntary agent."

"In the course of the Senate debate I shall demonstrate that the Watkins committee has done the work of the Communist party, that it not only cooperated in the achievement of Communist goals, but that in writing its report it distorted, misrepresented and omitted in its efforts to manufacture a plausible rationalization for advising the Senate to accede to the clamor for my scalp."

There he made it plain the best he could say for the Watkins committee was that it was too dumb to realize it was playing the Communists' game; the worst, game; the worst, that it deliberately connived to get him.

But if the members of the Senate are too stupid to know what the Communists are up to, and protect the country from them, who

in the United States can be depended upon to save the nation? By direct implication McCarthy held himself up as one whose fate is linked to that of the nation in the anti-Communist fight. He said: "It is not easy for a man to assert that he is the symbol of resistance to Communist subversion—that the nation's fate is in some respect tied to his own... but I take it you would rather I be frank than coy."
