'OCE Jinx' Stands In Ore Tech's Path

A six year jinx faces the Oregon Tech Owls and the three man coaching staff on the Mike High Campus as they prepare to meet the Oregon College of Education Wolves this Saturday afternoon at Monmouth, and spearheading this jinx will be the Owls number one enemy, coach Bill McArthur.

McArthur has piloted his four-year college to wins over the Owls in the past six seasons, and out of these six wins has come the title of the Oregon Collegiate Conference four different years. In fact, the rabbit-foot carrying coach has formed a monopoly on the OCC and the Owls have still to do anything about it.

HEADING
The Owls have run up a string of five straight victories so far this season and they are heading for six this weekend, but a huge barrier stands in their way, as McArthur has 17 returning lettermen back and three others with experience to give him a wealth of depth, something the Owls are missing.

Oregon Tech, with eight lettermen back from last year has relied upon its freshman to carry the bulk of the load, and this Saturday will prove or not just how much pressure these freshman gridders can take when under fire from McArthur's "old pros."

In last week's game against EOC, the Monmouth school started two seniors, a junior and a sophomore in the backfield, all of whom are potential threats to stop Oregon Tech's five game win streak.

Leading the OCE offensive drive will be quarterback Gene Owens, a 190 pound junior, who is exceptionally well off when it comes to passing accuracy and ball handling. To carry out the other duties

of the backfield will be halfbacks Darrell Davis and Don Wickstead, both seniors, and Larry Buss, the number three halfback, a hard running freshman back from the armed services, the person who everyone thinks will come the closest to filling the shoes left empty by Chuck Pinion's graduation last spring.

DEFENSIVE
For the Wolves defensive plans, Bill McHenry, Ray Hubbard, Jim Atkins and Paul Riley, ranging from 180 to 215 pounds will be a big rut in OT's prolonged winning streak, as the experienced linemen have spelled trouble for opposing runners all season long.

But Coach Rex Hunsaker and his two assistants, Art Kirkland and Bob Smith are not sitting back and bemoaning the fact of inexperience, and could stage their first win over OCE this Saturday afternoon and gain at least a tie for the OCC championship.

The Owls have some good break-away backs in Odie Canada, Willie Stinson, Cal "Sugar Jet" Smith, Linous Allen, Lyle Fleetwood, Doug Crippen and George "The Mole" Johnson, all of whom will see action at the halfback and fullback spots come Saturday afternoon.

PROGRESSES
To lead this group of backs, the Owls have two top-flight quarterbacks who can run or pass with the best of them as Ray Rosa, who has been looking better as the season progresses, and Dave Thomas could mean trouble for the Wolves.

To counteract the OCE experienced line, Smith will have four lettermen and three freshman in the probable starting lineup with Greene Rudd, Spike Carter, Jack Thur, Ken Sloan and John Alford showing the way.

Oregon Tech, should they want the title for the first time, and get away from being known as a runner-up, will have to topple the favored Wolves, and it is a "must" battle for the gridders from Monmouth as they have already lost one game, to Portland State by a 13-7 margin in the season's opener, and another loss would eliminate them from the title scene.

So. Cal Picked Over Foe

Washington's undermanned Huskies, with just one conference victory this season, take on the Rose Bowl-bound USC Trojans at Los Angeles Saturday in the weekend's featured Pacific Coast Conference contest.

UCLA, the nation's top team in The Associated Press poll, is idle. The Bruins, ineligible for a Pasadena assignment because they played in the last bowl game, meet USC next week.

USC, undefeated in conference play, is heavily favored to whip the Huskies. However, Husky quarterback Bob Cox, one of the Coast's top passers, is giving Trojan Coach Jess Hill some worries.

Hill worked at plugging holes in the erratic Trojan pass defense. Linebacker Marvin Gouge, who has proved adept at smashing pass plays in practice, is expected to be the key to whether USC can stop Cox.

Oregon, stunned 41-0 by UCLA, tries to get back on the victory road against Washington State at a homecoming game in Eugene. Quarterback George Shaw's aerial wizardry is expected to be too much for the on-and-off Cougars.

In the only other conference contest, California entertains Oregon State's battered Beavers at Berkeley. OSC hasn't won since the Beavers whipped Idaho in the season opener. California, paced by quarterback Paul Larson who is second only to Shaw in total offense in the nation, is heavily favored.

In non-conference games, Stanford is favored to whip San Jose State at Palo Alto and Idaho plays North Dakota at Moscow.

College of the Pacific entertains Marquette in a night game at Stockton, Calif.
