Power Study To Be Made

PORTLAND (AP) — Long-range planning for Pacific Northwest power needs, running to 1980 or beyond and looking into hydro, conventional steam and atomic generation, was authorized here Wednesday by the Columbia Basin Inter-Agency Commission.

At least five engineers, to be provided by Bonneville Power Administration, the Army Engineers, the Bureau of Reclamation and the Federal Power Commission.

Hans Norland Fire Insurance, 627 Pine St.

will make up a task force to draft the plans under the commission's power planning subcommittee.

This study will not duplicate work of the Northwest Governors' Power Policy Committee which has a 10-year study under way. Instead, the Inter-Agency Commission said in a report on its session here, one aspect of the study will be to provide a base for transmission planning to insure that fairly short range programs fit into long range needs.

In addition to considering types of power generation not thought of when present plans for Columbia Basin development were drafted, the study will seek answers to such

questions as maximum development economically justifiable at each hydro project and comparative values of storage dams with run-of-the-river dams.

The Inter-Agency Commission's fisheries committee reported that at the January meeting it expected to present a study on "what is needed first to save, and then to improve, the Columbia River fishery."

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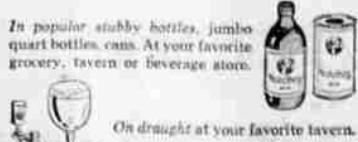
