Springfield Plant Sold

SEATTLE (AP) — Sale of the government-owned alcohol plant at Springfield, Ore., for \$227,000 was announced Wednesday by the General Services Administration.

The buyer of the "surplus" plant, built during World War II at a cost of \$3,093,000, is the Learner Investment Co. of San Francisco.

GSA regional Director O. C. Bredeen said the sale is subject to clearance by the Justice Department on anti-trust aspects.

The Willamette Valley Wood Chemical Co. plant was built in 1942 to test the feasibility of producing 190 proof ethyl alcohol and other by-products from waste woods.

It was utilized for only a short time and then was leased to the Oregon Wood Chemical Corp.

The lease expired in 1952 and the government relegated the plant to the surplus category, to be put up for sale.

All bids for the plant were rejected in 1953 as unacceptable. The GSA said the \$227,000 sale price, which was the top bid on the re-offering, is about \$40,000 higher than the top 1953 bid.

US Engineer General Urges Unified West Water Plans

PORTLAND (AP) — The chief of Army Engineers asserted Wednesday that "different segments of the water-using and water-developing public competing with one another, sometimes with cut-throat intensity," threaten the future of water resources development.

Major Gen. S. D. Sturgis Jr., in a speech read to the National Reclamation Assn. for him by Brig. Gen. William E. Potter, Missouri River Division engineer, asserted that reclamation is inseparably linked with all other water resources programs.

He urged that the association take leadership to advance the whole field of water-resources development "as a unified movement."

The general named no states in his speech but it was generally regarded that he referred in part to California opposition to Colorado River developments in his reference to "cut-throat" intensity of the fights over some projects. California is now involved in Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming and Utah. The latter would benefit from the proposed Upper Colorado River storage project.

"Today, water is not just a regional problem," Sturgis said. "It has become a national problem, and one of steadily increasing gravity."

"Year by year, demands have increased at such an accelerated rate, that now there is no part of the country free from the necessity of giving great thought and effort to the inter-related problems of river regulation and water supply."

He warned that funds for water resource development are going to be affected "for an indefinite but considerable number of years" because of the "tremendous costs of insuring our national survival."

He renewed a suggestion he voiced to the association last year in another speech read in his absence that there should be "a floor on water resources expenditures in addition to a ceiling," but mentioned no figures.

"Regional water aims can, in the long run, be achieved only a elements of an orderly and progressive national development program," Sturgis said.

"Local unity is not enough—not even regional unity is enough—if we are to succeed in our aims...."

"At a time when unity is most vital to our common purpose, we find different segments of the water using and water developing public competing with one another, sometimes with cut-throat intensity."

"If there is any one conviction I have formed in nearly 40 years' service in this field, it is, that if

each regional group continues to look out only for its own separate interests, as many have done in the past, these individual efforts will be defeated in detail, and the nation will suffer the economic consequences....
