U.S. Grange Chief Urges Competition

SPOKANE (AP) — The master of the National Grange urged greater U. S. competition for foreign markets and a "two-price" plan for wheat to help bring this about in an address prepared for delivery Wednesday.

Herchel D. Newsum said one-fourth of our total American agricultural production should find foreign markets because "in a great many instances nine-tenths of our total marketings may bring us only to the break-even point."

Newsum, here for the 68th annual meeting of the farm group, termed "amazingly successful" our transition from warboon inflation to stable prosperity. However, he warned, dangers of a setback are not over.

He said the two-price plan for other export crops would enable farmers to produce for world markets at competitive prices. Under this plan, farmers would receive government support at parity for all wheat going to human consumption in this country. Other wheat, farmers would sell at the competitive market price.

In addition to allowing more wheat to go to the foreign market, Newsum said, this plan would allow a reduction in production controls and in government activity in buying, warehousing and selling wheat. He said it would also lead to greater efficiency in farming through better farming practices and a shifting back of wheat acreage from the less efficient areas to land better suited for grain.

Under price supports, farmers have been encouraged to produce quantity rather than quality, he said.

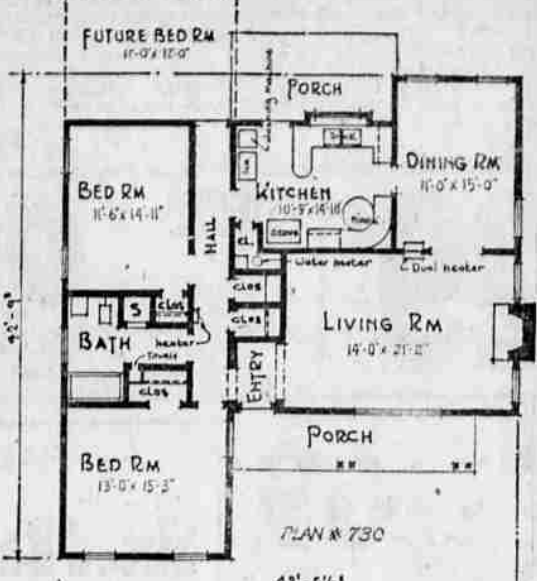
"An agent saw her and figured if she could turn it on and off like that, she ought to make an actress. He landed her role in Walt Disney's Christmas show, and she has been working ever since."

H. A. Praeger in a statement Tuesday at the group's annual convention in Topeka said that farm prosperity should depend on consumer demand.

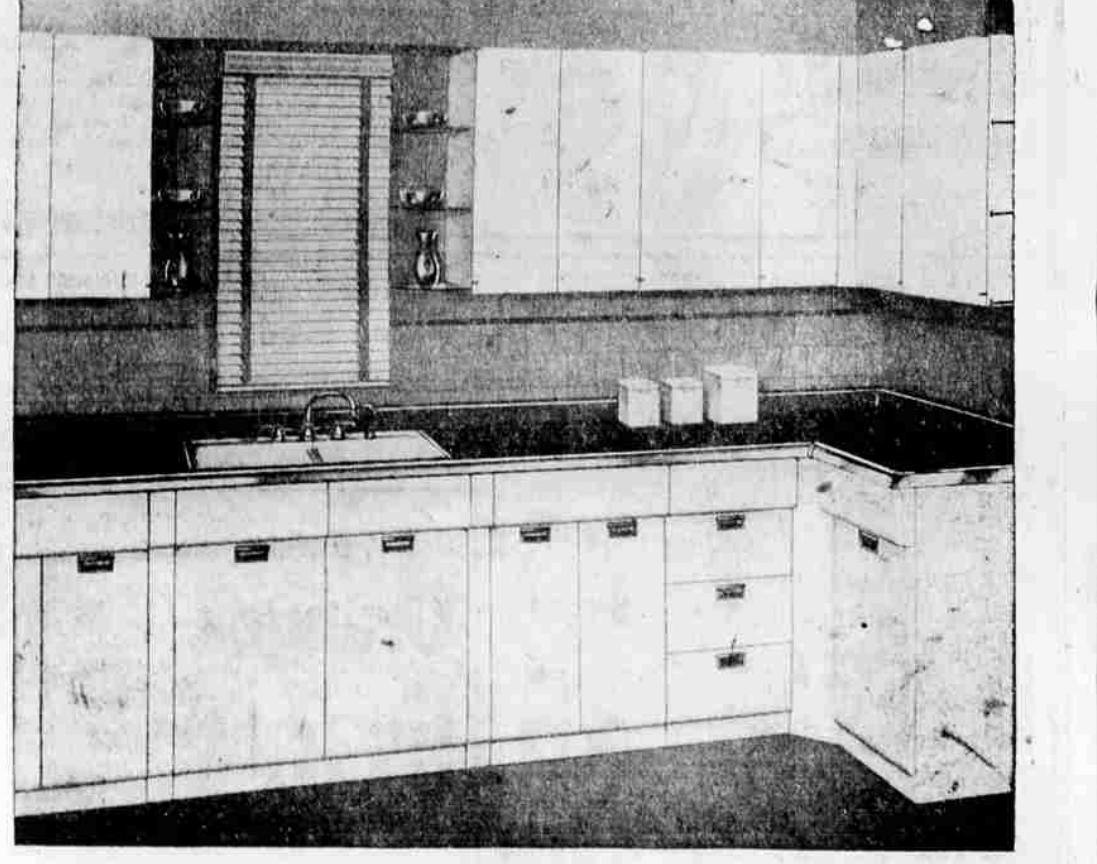
