Nat'l Guards Aid In Search

BECKLEY, W. Va. (AP) — National Guardsmen continued for the third day their search for two little sisters who disappeared 10 days ago. No trace of them has been found.

The foot-by-foot search for Irene Agee, 8, and her sister Mary, 6, has covered an area one by five miles in the remote, Egeria section of mountainous Raleigh County, southeast of here.

The girls were last seen when they were dismissed from classes at Egeria school Nov. 1.

Three National Guard units, totaling 120 men, were called out Monday at full army pay for a week's intensive search. They are covering ground searched last week by hundreds of volunteers before a deep snow halted the hunt.

Iron Lung Flown To Small Boy

US Weather Predicted By Almanac

LANCASTER, Pa. (AP)—Storms will feature the start of 1955 over most of the country but March will come and go like a lamb. And it'll be a pleasant summer with temperatures near normal and precipitation below.

So says the new edition of "Agricultural Almanac," or "Lancaster Almanac," a little book many persons have sworn by since John Quincy Adams was President.

In its 139 year history, the almanac has covered practically every subject from farming to higher, esthetics. This year's book runs from a day by day look at the weather to a recipe for hot tamales pie by Vice President Richard Nixon's wife, Patricia.

On page 38, there's a formula for predicting the number of snow storms per winter, if you can find a duck.

"The date of the first snow tells how many snows will fall during the winter—thus if the first snow falls on the 15th of a month, then 15 snows can be expected. But to qualify as the first, the snow must produce enough cover so you can track a duck through it."

Then, "if there's enough blue sky to patch a Dutchman's breeches, you can safely hang out your wash." That's as Pennsylvania Dutch as shoo-fly pie and the lament, "papa is all," meaning the old boy has passed away to his reward.

The book contains plenty of advice on how to run your affairs in line with the moon and the signs

of the zodiac. The sign of the crab, for example, is good to prune grape vines while the fish is best in making "soukkrout."

The almanac says cows that listen to radio music produce more milk. But Holsteins prefer soft, semi-classical numbers; Guernseys like western songs, and Jerseys prefer swing.
