

UN Lecture To Be Given

Karl M. Capper-Johnson, professor of history and international relations at Lewis and Clark College, and recently professor of international relations at Carleton College, Northfield, Minnesota, has been invited to speak here Saturday, November 13 by a group of interested persons.

He is also the official head of the Oregon Association of United Nations and will speak on that subject at the luncheon at the Winema Hotel Empire Room, planned in his honor. His speaking schedule will also take him to other Southern Oregon cities.

Capper-Johnson, native of Leeds, England, has been a lecturer on international affairs for many years, is a writer of note and in addition to numerous other books, has written "A New Instrument of Government," an analysis of the Charter of the United Nations.

He has had first-hand information on international relations in visits to France, Italy, Poland, Belgium, Czechoslovakia and other countries and more recently has been personally interested in relief work among the farmers and villagers of the Magyar race, living in Slovakia, north of the Danube.

He is also rated as one of the best informed lecturers in America on the Communist revolution. Among those planning to hear him are the Rev. and Mrs. D. W. Oregon Weed Meet Planned

Water hemlock control in Deschutes and Klamath counties, along with other major weed problems of the state, is scheduled for discussion November 16 and 17 at the annual Oregon Weed Conference in Portland.

Conference President Allen C. Tom Ruffin, says the public is invited to all sessions at the Imperial Hotel starting at 10:30 a.m., November 16. Oregon State College research and extension workers, industry representatives, and public officials will lead discussions in planning Oregon's 1955 weed control campaign.

Gene Lear, Redmond, Deschutes county extension agent, will review a campaign in this area to bring water hemlock under control. The poisonous plant has taken a widespread toll among livestock and is known to have caused human fatalities.

Weed control in cereal crops based on Oregon State College trials on rates and timing with hormone sprays is one of the major topics.

Of special interest to both farmers and home owners will be reports on common ragweed—the bay fever weed—that is now spotted throughout Oregon.

Hugh Taylor, state department of agriculture, will pinpoint areas where ragweed is found; Dr. Harold M. Erickson, Portland, state health officer, will discuss its threat to human well-being.

Other program topics include possibility of controlling velvet grass in pastures and fields, crop defoliants, and spray equipment.

Helicopter Hit By Rifle Bullet

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—An Army pilot escaped serious injury Wednesday night when a bullet fired from the ground crashed into the cockpit of a helicopter he was landing at a swank hotel's heliport here.

The pilot—Warrant Officer B. L. Pearson of Fort Riley, Kan.—received cuts on the face from flying plexiglass. He said the incident almost caused him to crash.

Pearson said he was circling the lavish Western Hills Hotel layout here for the third time when the bullet, apparently fired from a rifle, struck the cockpit.

Police, who were investigating said residents in the area had objected to low-flying helicopters in the area. Pearson said he was at about 1,000 feet when his craft was struck.
