Reclamation Group Refuses To Endorse Partner Power

PORTLAND, Ore.—The National Reclamation Assn. wound up its 23rd annual convention Wednesday by refusing to endorse the Eisenhower administration's partnership water and power development policy after being told it would be "untimely" to approve it now.

By a vote of 11-5, with one state not voting, the 17-state organization tabled a motion to approve a resolution putting it on record for "active support to the program."

Only Monday Secretary of Interior McKay himself had appealed to the group for "continued cooperation" in support of the program.

Glenn G. Saunders, Denver, made the tabling motion after saying he did not want to see the proposal approved or defeated. He said the election Nov. 2 was not a "howling success for the Republicans," and that his state's delegates were "not too sure what you mean by this partnership."

He added that the Colorado caucus has decided it would be best not to consider a resolution at this time on the partnership policy.

Harry W. Horton, California's member of the resolutions committee, presented the endorsement resolution from the floor, explaining it was a shortened version of a much longer proposal the resolutions committee had tabled.

It was brought out that the resolutions committee had approved the principle of its resolution 9-4 at midday Wednesday but had refused to recommend it to the convention because it was brought up less than 24 hours before the business session.

L. E. Coles, Prineville, Ore., new second vice president of the association, tried to get a substitute adopted.

It did not mention the partnership program but expressed appreciation to Secretary McKay for attending the 1953 and 1954 conventions and to the Interior Department for its "sincere endeavors... in its approach to the problems of reclamation." The substitute was rejected 11-4 before the tabling motion was made.

Coles said he favored the partnership policy himself but that he had worked for a man, Sen. Gordon (R-Ore), who was "defeated on it." He added that it appeared the voters of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana did not favor it.

The convention voted to meet in Lincoln, Neb., in 1955. C. Petrus Peterson of Lincoln was elected to a four-year term as president of the association.

Throughout the meeting, speakers said it was necessary to convince the whole nation on the need for reclamation. They also spoke of a vital need for solidarity among the Western states for individual projects if the program is to go forward.

The board of directors authorized a scientific study to determine the prospective food needs of the nation in view of the population increase with the idea of combating opponents who point to surpluses as a reason for not bringing more land into production.

The executive committee also was authorized to consider expansion of the association's Washington staff to put it in better position to present the reclamation program to the nation.

A resolution was adopted calling on the 17 Western states "to maintain closed ranks and vigorously and unanimously support a reclamation program designed to fully develop the land and water resources of the reclamation states within the limit of available water supplies."

This was generally regarded as criticism of California for its opposition to developments up the Colorado River, including the proposed billion dollar Upper Colorado River storage project.

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'54 Corn Crop Estimate Told

The nation's estimated corn crop took another dip Wednesday when the U. S. Department of Agriculture released the November crop estimates.

The estimate is 10,930,000 bushels less than last month's official forecast of 2,949,643,000 bushels. It compares with 3,176,615,000 bushels produced last year and 3,087,484,000 for the ten year 1943-52 average.

No new estimates will be made for wheat and most other grain crops until mid-December the report stated.

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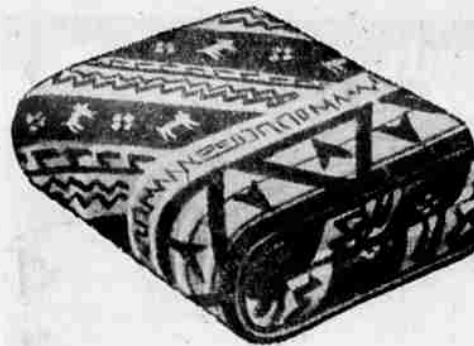
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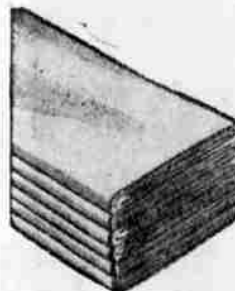

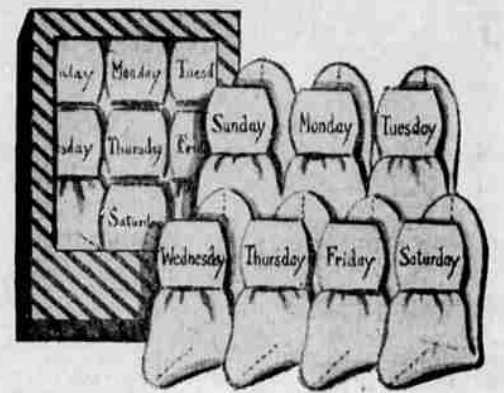
