OREGON COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, MONMOUTH — Oregon Tech's vaunted speed was buried in the mud here Saturday afternoon as the Wolves of OCE posted their fifth straight win over Tech Owls by a 27-7 count.

The Owls can tie for the OCC title with the Wolves with a win over South Oregon at Ashland Saturday, but the thought remained—small consolation for the Hilltoppers after their speed—burning backs skidded and sputtered in the ankle-deep mud in the loss to the Wolves.

Tech's offense, based on the talent of breakaway backs Willie Stinson, Cal "Sugar Jet" Smith and Odie Canada, was useless on the sloppy gridiron.

POWER CLUB
The Wolves, primarily a power club and, as usual, higher than a kite for the clash with the Owls, were hampered far less by the mud.

Should the Red Raiders of SOC tie OTE Saturday, the title would go to coach Bill McArthur's Wolves for the fifth straight year which represents the life of the OCC. The Wolves whipped Ore-Tech in 1948 and 1949, too, so Saturday's win was the seventh win for OCE over the Owls in as many years, although Hunsaker didn't take the OTE helm until 1950, the first year of the conference.

The Owls scored first Saturday, two-thirds through the first period, and Tech rosters who braved the rain were certain that at last McArthur's long-time jinx would be broken.

Doug Crippen actually set up the first score when he kicked deep on OCE's one yard line. The Wolves gained four yards in a couple of jabs at the line before Larry Buss, the Wolves' brilliant spark plug runner all afternoon, kicked out. The mud-soaked ball didn't travel far and Canada, on the return, was dumped just 27 yards away from the goal.

MASTER
On the first play, Ray Rosa, a quarterbacking master on the optional play, started around left end. When he felt the first OCE tackle, he tossed a neat lateral to Smith, and the sugarbush aloshed all the way through the mud for the touchdown, then kicked the extra point.

That served to light a fuse under the Wolves and, before the first period had ended, the Monmouth eleven had a touchdown. Oregon Tech kicked off and, after Darrell "Mouse" Davis, who scored three of the four touchdowns in the slushy 60 minutes of action, re-

turned from his 18 to the 46. The Wolves started to roll.
Five plays and 54 yards later, the Wolves had a touchdown. The big play was Buss' 34-yard scamper on a power play to the right. Only a desperation lunge by Smith ended Buss' trip on the three-yard line. Davis found a huge hole on the left side on the next play and even OCE rooters didn't seem to mind after quarterback Gene Owens failed the extra point on a running play after he was forced to go on the ground when the slippery ball skidded out of Davis' hands, down in holding position for an Owens' kick.

An OTI gamble early in the second quarter cost the Owls a touchdown and gave the Wolves a lead they never relinquished at 12-7. With fourth down and just inches to go on his own 20, Rosa surprisingly chose a handoff play instead of a quarterback sneak. Stinson barely reached the line of scrimmage.

Buss gained four on a couple of plays, then Owens hit end Joe Roberts with a jump pass and the Wolves had a first down on the five-yard line. Buss was stopped short by inches on the next play but Davis, on a quickie, bombed through on the next play.

FAILED
An Owens — to — Roberts pass for extra point failed, but less than three minutes later it was 19-7 when the Wolves employed a substitute quarterback who has played sparingly this season. Bill Brown, his clean red uniform sticking out among the 21 mud-caked players, rifled a pass to Buss.

Buss caught the ball on the 23 with the play originating from Tech's 48 and it was Smith who saved the score again when he hauled Buss down on the seven-yard line.

But it was just a temporary respite for the Owls. Davis, on the next play, sliced through on a trap maneuver in the line. Owens' kick was good and the half ended that way, 19-7.

The Owls, fighting desperately in the third quarter, held the Wolves scoreless but Tech's fast-stepping backs couldn't find high gear in the mud.

Early in the fourth, the Owls lost the ball on downs on OCE's 42. Then came three plays that definitely wiped out any chances the Owls had to cook up a comeback. Davis went for three on two consecutive plays. Then Buss, by far the best mudder of the day — 153 yards in 23 carries — cracked straight through the middle. He was still on his feet when he found running room in the secondary, turned aside the last Tech defender with a stiff arm on the 35 and went the rest of the way. The 52-yard run made it 25-7 after Owens missed another kick but the Wolves picked up two insurance points on a safety minutes later.

REFUSING
The Tech line, refusing to quit despite the huge deficit, made a Herculean goal line stand after Davis intercepted a pass and ran back 35 yards to Tech's five-yard line. Four straight line plays fell short by inches and Oregon Tech took over. On the first play a handoff missed first and Rosa, trying to scamper out of danger, was dumped by guard Bill McHenry before the goal line.

Rex Hunsaker and assistants Art Kirkland and Bob Smith had no excuses to offer. On a dry field, it may well have been a different story. But the Owl coaches didn't mention the mud. It was a disappointing loss, made all the more bitter by the mud that obliterated players' numbers in just two or three plays.

Oregon Stops Cougars

EUGENE, (AP) — George Shaw's wizardry, passing, running with the ball and even recovering a fumble, earned Oregon undisputed Northern Division Coast Conference football honors Saturday with a 26-14 homecoming victory over Washington State.

Oregon has beaten Washington and Idaho and ranks third in the all-conference standings with four wins and three losses. The Ducks go to Corvallis for the season-ending "traditional" with Oregon State Saturday.

SLIPPERY
Shaw accounted for three of Oregon's four touchdowns, despite the rain and slippery field. Twice in the first half, he rallied his team after WSC touchdowns to tie the count, making both conversions himself.

The Cougars struck with T formations and marched 67 and 77 yards to scoring territory on the first half. A third drive fizzled on a fumble. Quarterback Bob Overton made both scores and Frank Sarno converted each time.

But the Ducks struck back quickly. Shaw ran 16 yards for the first Oregon score. For the second, he returned a punt 44 yards and then tossed a 31-yard scoring pass to Leroy Campbell just before the half.

INTERCEPTED
On the first play of the third quarter, Oregon's Hal Reeve intercepted a pass and ran 27 yards to the goal line.

Later in the third period, Shaw recovered a WSC fumble in mid-field. He threw 19 yards to Reeve and 22 yards to fullback Jasper McGee to go to the 10. Hallback Dick James ran over the goal.

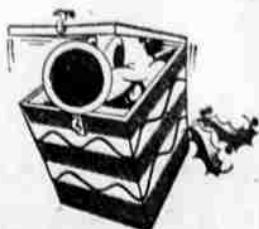
Shaw completed 10 of 18 pass attempts for 159 yards and made a net 2 yards, running, gaining 35 and losing 33 in nine carries. The yardage pushed his total to 1,415 for the season in his duel with California's Paul Larson for national honors.

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Coach Sees New Oval Mark

NEW YORK, (AP) — We have a feeling, amounting practically to an obsession, that the track coach at Oxford University, Franz Stampfl, was talking through his topper the other day when he said to a reporter as follows:

"A year ago the four-minute mile was called 'the magic mile.' It was nothing of the sort. The four-minute mile was run four times last season and in the next few years it will be run 40 times. In 30 years I expect the record to be 3:50 — possibly lower."

MENTOR
The Vienna-born mentor is the man who taught Roger Bannister how to run, and so must be granted a high standing in his profession. He's entitled to make predictions, too. But we are of the firm opinion that his is one time he was talking when he should have been listening.

Coach Stampfl is not going to live long enough to see 40 four-minute miles listed in the record books. He probably will not personally ever see another mile run under that figure, since Bannister has asked to be counted out. And there never will be a 3:50 mile run by a human being without the use of afterburners.

CONFRONT
That last statement is taking in a lot of time, but we're willing to be stuck with it if anyone wants to clip this out and confront us with it 50 or 60 years from now. We'll even toss in the prediction that this generation will not again see two men break four minutes in the same race, as Bannister and John Landy did last summer in Vancouver.

Our feeling, stated simply, is that there must be, sometime, an absolute limit to human endeavor. The fact that 32 track and field records have been broken this year, and that boys are growing bigger and stronger and eating fortified breakfast food, doesn't make this any less true. Some time it's got to stop, and we think that in the case of running the mile that point has just about been reached.

Huskie Frosh Outwade Foes

SEATTLE, (AP) — There still may be some doubt as to which has the better football team but Washington knew today its frosh were better waders than the Washington State Rookies—and had a 14-0 victory to prove it.

The teams slipped, sloshed and exchanged fumbles (three each) Saturday in Seattle, with Washington passing to one touchdown and sliding to another.

Jon Wambo, reserve quarterback, opened the fireworks with a second quarter pass to Fred Emerson, good for 45 yards. Eddie Romano relieved Wambo then and tossed a touchdown to Bob Austin. It was Austin who scored the other, too, plunging two yards on the first play of the fourth period.

End Rich Brandt kicked both conversions. Dick Paysano, Washington halfback, scampered 47 yards in the last period for a tally that was nullified by an illegal motion penalty.

The alert Washington defense intercepted three WSC passes and by Cougars End Ray Taipalo, one Husky loss was intercepted by Ray Steiger, WSC fullback hope, was bottled by the defense and the mud. Washington's promising fullback, Jimmy Jones, was nursing a knee injury and saw no action.

California Roms To 46-7 Victory

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Oregon State held California to two touchdowns in the first half Saturday but then the avalanche, mainly in the shape of Jerry Drew, struck and the Bears romped to a 46-7 victory.

The worn-down Beavers, winners of only one of eight games this season, went 49 yards to score a minute before the game's end. Quarterback Jim Withrow tossed 15 yards to left end Leon Hiltner for the tally.

Drew, speedy Negro second string fullback, scored California's last three touchdowns on runs of 67, 59 and 54 yards. He gained 263 yards for the day, topping a previous individual game record for California held by Johnny Olszewski.

Rookie Quarterback Hugh McGuire started California's scoring late in the first period with a 25-yard pass to Jim Hanifan. In the second quarter, Hanifan also took a 17-yard end zone pass from Paul Larson for another touchdown.

Larson completed seven of 14 pass attempts for 128 yards and made a net gain of one on the ground, in carrying the ball five times. The 129 yards brought his national total to 1,375, 40 yards behind Oregon's George Shaw in their duel for national honors.

The Beavers entertained Shaw and Oregon at home at Corvallis Saturday in the season's wind-up for both teams.

Cox had a bad passing day, completing only four of 14 attempts with one interception. McCain completed five of seven.

Washington got 12 first downs and a total net yardage of 213 gained, compared with USC's 16 first downs and 374 yards.
