Cordon Cites Reasons For Defeat In Senate Campaign

PORTLAND — Sen. Guy Cordon, citing what he said were the reasons for his defeat in the Oregon Senate election, Sunday accused the Democratic winner, Richard L. Neuberger, of "demagoguery" or "ignorance."
He said the Neuberger organization had distorted the issues in the campaign, adding: "My opponent used an almost Machiavellian expertness to drum such misleading arguments as 'the preference clause means low cost power.' This either is barefaced demagoguery or absolute ignorance of the facts."
He said that newspapers aided Neuberger by printing again and again in their news columns Neuberger's accusation of resources "giveaways."
"Neuberger made a charge and we would answer it and dispose of it. Then, a week or ten days later, he would repeat it," Cordon said.
Neuberger succeeded in getting the Republican Party on the defensive in Oregon and keeping it there," Cordon declared.
"I have never been in any sense a politician... In my 10 1/2 years in the Senate, I made no attempt at self praise or personal advertisement. That is chargeable to me," he said.
He declined to comment on the campaign efforts of the Republican Party in the state or of his own organization.
"My opponent had a solid year of campaigning and I had two months. I covered 35 counties many times, making as many as five speeches a day. But I didn't have enough time," Cordon explained.
He said he had remained in Washington too long, handling Senate business.
He said that he thought the

efforts of Sen. Wayne Morse on behalf of Neuberger were of little value.
Cordon plans to return to Washington, probably at the end of the week, for the special Senate session on censure charges against Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).
But first, Cordon said, he plans a goose-hunting trip.

Court Clash Over Traffic Case Told

A bitter court fight was expected late Monday when Defense Attorney Joe O'Neill and Deputy District Attorney Robert Kerr clash in district court over a traffic complaint against City Fireman John D. Mitchell, who was also indicted on a manslaughter charge last week.
O'Neill claims the district attorney's office concealed the fact from him that it planned to seek a grand jury indictment in Mitchell's case which was the outgrowth of a fatal traffic accident.
After a charge of failure to drive on the right side of the highway was filed against Mitchell, O'Neill filed a demurrer to the complaint on grounds that it did not state a crime.
Saturday morning Mitchell was arraigned before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg on the manslaughter charge. He is accused of driving an automobile under the influence of liquor on the wrong side of Highway 97 when it struck another car and fatally injured Mrs. Edna Juliana Evanson of Modesto, California.
O'Neill told the court he had asked Kerr at the time the traffic case demurrer was filed when the district attorney wanted to argue the matter.
"The district attorney's office told me there was no hurry about it," O'Neill declared. "We know now that all the time it was the district attorney's intention to take the case to the grand jury before the matter was settled in district court. The district attorney knows that under the law, prior conviction or acquittal bars further prosecution on the same set of facts."
O'Neill said whether the traffic case is dismissed or Mitchell is found guilty or acquitted of the charge by District Judge Van Vactor, it will be a bar to prosecution of the manslaughter charge in circuit court.
When asked about the case District Attorney Frank Alderson would make no comment.
